#### THINK ON THESE THINGS – August 2020

I am enjoying preaching through the Lord's Prayer this summer. The theme was rightly timed so I hope it has provided you with Gospel truth and strength. August 2 will focus on petition "Give us our daily bread." August 9 will be Confirmation Sunday as we confirm the Anderson twins as part of worship. August 16 will focus on generosity with a message called "What's in Your Wallet?"

One aspect of the Lord's Prayer needed more depth than one sermon on Sunday morning. Forgiveness is the hardest part of the Lord's Prayer. With this thought in mind, I'll be launching a new sermon series on August 23 called "Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us." I'll be tackling issues like how do I start to forgive? Why is forgiveness so unnatural and how do I forgive myself are focal themes of entire sermons. The human element is a sticking point. What if someone doesn't want or seek my forgiveness — should I still forgive? Does forgiving someone say that it's ok what was done or does forgiveness mean I still have to be in relationship with someone who has hurt me? What benefit does forgiveness offer to the one who forgives? How does forgive and forget go against our human nature?

As we examine our world today, the need for repentance and forgiveness calls out to all people. Broken relationships between family members strain our bonds of love. Parents and children go years without a kind word or shared meal because of what happened. Church members walk away from the place they love due to wounded feelings or harsh words. Entire groups of people blame others and carry the hurt of an unredeemed past. Unforgiveness chains the damage of the past while denying joy, peace and contentment for the future. We need hope for the days to come.

Get ready for a powerful time of Holy Spirit movement among us! I pray that you will consider relationships in your own life that are strained, stressed or shattered. God's desire for wholeness and healing in your life will be on display! Remember starting in August, we'll be going to one service only at 10am.

Young People's Ministry

I've been doing a lot of reading lately. I feel like I'm in that really great sweet spot right now that my daughter naps several times a day and goes to bed moderately early, and there's a raging pandemic out there, so where else can I go? So I've turned back to one of my first and truest loves: books.

I find when I read multiple books at once, very often there will be themes that will show up in several of them at the same time. I get so excited about my books that I can't stand to finish one before picking the next one up, so I am almost always reading

multiple at once. This time, the enduring theme has been kindness. What a word for us today in the culture and climate we're in. Everything is falling apart, strangers and friends alike are screaming at each other on the internet, it's an election year, so naturally, everything is just awful. But that word, "kindness," just keeps resurfacing anyway.

Sometimes, it seems like kindness gets a bad rap as a meek and mild thing you do. If you say someone is kind, it generally is interpreted to mean that they are weak or can be run over easily by more boisterous or passionate people. However, I'm discovering that it is quite the opposite. To be kind is to display a great deal of strength and I believe (in some ways) it can change the world.

There are a million ways to practice kindness, but the two big overarching themes seem to be active decisions to show kindness to others (holding the door open, helping with a hated chore, paying for someone else's coffee) and the less-noticed act of kindness of assuming the best of others. This means, when you sit down at the table across from someone who believes different than you about politics, religion, or any other divisive issue, you *don't* start with all of the assumptions you hold about them based on talk show talking points. Let them talk and tell you what they believe and why. You might find there's a whole lot more nuance to their point of view than you expected. When you come to the table with an open mind and kindness, you establish civility. Imagine if everyone were to do that.

This makes me remember a book I just finished called *Unfollowed: A Memoir of Loving and Leaving the Church* by former Westboro Baptist Church member Megan Phelps-Roper (yes, *that* Westboro Baptist). She talks about the kind and genuine connections she encountered with people on Twitter being the lifeline to get her out of a church that regularly hurled hate and insults at people attending military funerals or visiting a local park. Kindness was the balm needed to soothe the hate she'd raised to exact on others and provided her with a lifeline out Westboro to healthier relationships with others and equipped her with a curiosity for discovering a loving God. If kindness can save someone from their indoctrination in a hateful cult, it certainly can't hurt your relationships with others.

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I've been challenged to take more steps in civility and kindness lately by asking myself the following questions:

How might my opinions be different if I were in their shoes?

What in their growing up years or other life experiences might cause this person to believe this way?

How are their beliefs different than the traditional talking points that generally accompany their point of view?

How can I show this person God's love for them?

Is this person saying something harmful that I have a responsibility to address as someone who, as a Christian and a Methodist, has promised to "accept the freedom and power God gives [me] to resist evil, injustice, and oppression in whatever forms the present themselves" (UMC baptismal covenant)?

Kindness is hard work, but it's good work and we're going to need all of God's people leading the way in this regard as we move forward farther into the disaster that is 2020 and the subsequent rebuilding after this is all over.


the caregivers. (AIR) Our AIR Ministries can't meet right now due to the need for physical distancing and health concerns but we will resume this ministry when it is safe.

Due to Covid-19, we will adjust our Refuge youth group gatherings in order to ensure optimal health and safety for all involved. Regardless of when the school year begins, we will start meeting **August 23**. Our plan is to meet outdoors as often as the weather permits but will be prepared to meet indoors in the Fellowship Hall (in the main church building) when it is too hot, cold, or in the case of inclement weather.

Youth should bring a mask with them each week to youth group. If we are outside, they will not be required to wear the mask as long as they maintain physical distance of 6+ feet from one another. Masks and social distancing will be required indoors. We will set the room up so that it is easy to know whether they are 6+ feet apart. All games will be no-contact and we will not be sharing a meal.
