

# First United Methodist church



In August, I'll be starting an exciting new sermon series. I greatly enjoyed the Long Short Story that focused on the narrative of the Bible. Now, our attention shifts to an area of Scripture that most people don't know much about – the Prophets. They are a grouping of eighteen books of the Old Testament – approximately one quarter of the entire Bible. I have to admit until about six years ago the minor prophets were an area of the Bible where I spent little time. Too confusing, too many obscure references, too dark and judgmental for my tastes. Why was God so angry with the people? Does any of their writing still apply to us? Since then, I learned the prophets were speaking TO the people of Israel but they were writing FOR us as well. Yes, many of the specifics don't apply to us – they were written for THEN AND THERE. God's message is for HERE AND NOW, too. So, I decided to dig into the texts and see what the prophets have to say to us today.

<u>August 1 – Why Does God Care How We Live?</u> The prophets spoke about everyday living like treatment of others, care for the poor, how governments should behave. God's creation involves economics, business, justice, farming, laws – it's important!

<u>August 8 – Choices Have Consequences</u> – How does sin affect our lives and why does prophetic preaching always involve grace as well as judgment?

<u>August 15 – Ordinary People Bring the Kingdom of God</u> – God uses people like me and you to bring the Kingdom – what is our role in God's work?

<u>August 22 – Do We Have Liberty and Justice for All?</u> Prophets spoke truth about people being mistreated and oppressed. How does behavior affect us here and now?

<u>August 29- How Are We Going Through the Motions of Worship?</u> If you think attending worship, singing songs and offering prayer and money are the only things God expects of you, be sure to attend this Sunday! You'll learn a lot about true worship!

I don't know about you but this path feels daunting to me. Yet, my compelling sense is that we need to hear God's prophetic word of warning and repentance during our days. God's ultimate goal is to bring the people closer to the LORD and to live according to His purpose. For me, that is a motive to preach these sermons on Sunday! JOIN US!!

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Last week we were able to regain some semblance of normalcy as we resumed youth trips for the first time since Covid-19 hit. This year, we decided to stay in town to do our mission trip and sleep at the church. We served a Greater KC area location – The Hub in the Argentine District, Leavenworth County locations – The Leavenworth Mission and The Salvation Army, and our own church.

The Hub is a mission outpost of the United Methodist Church that seeks to serve the needs of their community through a food pantry, clothing store, and much, much more. We painted walls and did other various tasks to make the building look warm and inviting for anyone who enters. We learned so much about looking at giftings and resources, rather than deficiencies, especially in areas that are commonly branded as "lacking."



The Leavenworth Community Shelter of Hope and Welcome Central is located at 311 Kiowa. It houses the Night Shelter, a Day Center and Welcome Central. The community of Leavenworth pulled together and helped to make this a reality in 2018. It is such a blessing to those who are homeless who need a place to sleep or food, and those who need such help as finding affordable housing, filling out job applications, or finding information to help treat substance abuse. Welcome Central works closely with the Leavenworth Guidance Center to provide services.

During the pandemic, the Shelter remained open to 18 guests who were currently housed at the shelter. Five staff members worked many extra hours to ensure the Shelter and the Day Center was able to service the guests. There has been great volunteer support from FUMC membership, especially Jim Walley who is the scheduler. He makes sure each shift on Thursday/Friday has at least two volunteers. Church members who volunteer are Cynthia & Jamie Walley, Kathi LaMoe, Marti Crow, Jim Wolfe, Mike & Jan Mix, Wade & Valynn Schmierer, Linda Landzettel, Jeff & Mary Breshears, Dave & Taylor York, Steve Wiegers, Lea Ann Weilbacher, Rick Sanders, Keith Hubbert.

People who are willing to serve as substitutes for the regular volunteers are especially important to help ensure all shifts are covered and have two volunteers. The Director of the Night Shelter conducts Volunteer Training at various times throughout the year. If you want to join the team, contact Jim Walley or Mary Lou Anderson.

God placed on my heart a compassionate concern for the homeless population and a desire to play a small part in providing some help to them. I enjoy interacting with the guests and rejoicing with them when they share successes such as finding jobs, reuniting with family, or finding affordable housing. It's heartwarming when the Leavenworth community demonstrates how giving they are by donating laundry supplies, freshly made casseroles, snack items, and gifts such as a motorized wheel chair or a car to one of the needy guests.
