
As a pastor, I've had a chance to officiate two weddings in September. What a blessing of goodness to see new families started and participate in the delight of celebration!

They also visited and sang hymns with church members who may not be able to attend services. Then volunteers played bingo at the Lansing Care and Rehab Center.

The next Serve Day is scheduled for October 16. We'll be working at the HUB, a new Methodist ministry in Kansas City. We will also be laying tile in the Ed. building basement and making and delivering thank you gifts to medical personnel. Join us!











Since 1993, more than 188 million Operation Christmas Child gift-filled shoeboxes have been distributed to children in more than 170 countries and territories. Children who receive a shoebox gift also participate in The Greatest Journey—a 12-lesson discipleship program. Children learn from trained, local volunteers what it means to follow Jesus and share their faith with friends and family.

You can create a shoebox, or you can purchase items to go into a shoebox and AIR ministry will assemble them. Donations can be brought to the church office.

Small Toys - harmonica, puzzle, yo-yo, jacks, toy car, frisbee, jump rope, kite, flashlight with batteries

Clothing - hat, flip flops, shirt, socks, mittens



75% of pastors report being "extremely stressed" or "highly stressed"

90% work between 55 to 75 hours per week

90% feel fatigued and worn out every week

40% report a serious conflict with a parishioner at least once a month

65% feel their family is in a glass house




Mitchim to Stitch





All summer over 20 members of Itchin' to Stitch have been making fleece blankets. They have now completed 80 blankets to give to the Joy Meadows Foster Community in Basehor. They plan to dedicate the blankets Oct. 10, during the worship service so they can be Christmas presents for the foster kids. Foster kids are often moved from home to home and they don't have a lot of items they can call their own.

This huge project began with an anonymous donation of over 140 yards of fleece material. Then Teresa Hicks used some money from Phelba Wecas' memorial fund to buy additional material. Phelba was a teacher who loved kids and loved to sew, so it was a perfect way to honor her. Many hands made light work, so thank you to all the volunteers who gave their time.








We extended the time to read our next story to allow other people to join the conversation. If you love to read, consider joining us.

"A Voice in the Wind" is a historical fiction story of a young Christian-Jewish slave named Hadassah living under the Roman Empire. When Hadassah is captured by Roman soldiers, her entire family is killed. She serves as a slave to a teenaged Roman woman named Julia, whose parents marry her off to a much older man. Although Julia initially dislikes Hadassah because of her plain appearance, she comes to trust her. Hadassah is faithful and kind but afraid of many things. As the story progresses, she gains the courage to tell others about her faith and the God that she serves. The story goes into many different side characters, such as the young gladiator Atretes, who—as well as the main characters—are all searching for peace and purpose but unable to find it in the world of pleasures Rome has to offer. Throughout the entire novel, Hadassah's Christian faith (kept a secret for fear of death) is continually challenged and evolved, helping her overcome the harsher aspects of life as a slave in the Roman Empire.
