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

One of the biblical principles by which I live is a Matthew 25 vision. "When did we see you hungry, naked, thirsty, stranger, sick or prisoner, the righteous will ask the King." Jesus taught his disciples that the greatest among you will be a servant (Matthew 23:11). How are you aspiring to be great for the Kingdom of God? Who are you using your talent, time and treasure to serve in Jesus' name? My hope for FUMCL is that we will be known as a church that serves our neighbors with generosity and devotion. We'll be a church that is always willing to help and support ministries. It may seem foolish sometimes to give ourselves away like we do but I'd rather be known for being foolish for Christ than being a church that only cares about itself.

I recently read about a long term study of 678 Catholic sisters 75 to 107 years of age who are members of the School Sisters of Notre Dame congregation. It began in 1986, to examine the onset of Alzheimer's disease and was conducted at both the University of Minnesota and the University of Kentucky. Similar environmental influences and general lifestyles among the participants make the nuns an ideal population to study. One of the sources of information studied were the sister's autobiographies written just before they took their vows, which, for most sisters, was between the ages 19 and 21. After coding these archives, several themes arose. Positivity was closely related to longevity, as well as idea density. Idea density is an analysis which measures ideas in speech and writing. Upon review, it was found that an essay's lack of linguistic density (e.g., complexity, vivacity, fluency) functioned as a significant predictor of its author's risk for developing Alzheimer's disease in old age. However, the study also found that the nuns who wrote positively in their personal journals were more likely to live longer than their counterparts. The researchers found three indicators of longer life when coding the sister's autobiographies: the amount of positive sentences, positive words, and the variety of positive emotions used. The less positivity in writing correlated with greater mortality. Roughly 80% of nuns whose writing was measured as lacking in linguistic density went on to develop Alzheimer's disease in old age.


May 30 - Memorial Day - NO AIR

Just about all of us know someone who has lost a loved one. We want to be there for them, but often we feel uncomfortable. What do I say? What can I do? Below are some universal statements that NEVER help bring comfort.

At least she lived a long life, many people die young.

He is in a better place, he's your guardian angel now.

She brought this on herself.

There is a reason for everything.

Aren't you over him yet, he has been dead for awhile now.

You can have another child still.

She was such a good person God wanted her to be with him.

I know how you feel (actually, you don't)

She did what she came here to do and it was her time to go. Be strong.

Instead, you might want to use one of the following statements.

I am so sorry for your loss.

I wish I had the right words, just know I care.

I don't know how you feel, but I am here to help in any way I can.

You and your loved one will be in my thoughts and prayers.

My favorite memory of your loved one is...

I am always just a phone call away.

Give a hug instead of saying something.

We all need help at times like this, I am here for you.

I am usually up early or late, if you need anything.

Saying nothing, just be with the person.

Sometimes the best gift you can give someone grieving is your presence.



If you are experiencing grief, GriefShare might be for you. It's a support group where you can share with others and learn coping strategies through videos, homework, and discussion. Please consider joining us. We have two groups, one for spouses only on the third Tuesday of each month at 2 pm, and one for anyone who is grieving loss on the second and fourth Wednesdays of the month from 5-7 pm. Serving Christ by Serving Our Community

Tony McNeill served on the Lansing City Council for 12 years before being sworn in as the Mayor in January of 2021. During his years on the council, Tony has had the opportunity to lead the city through several projects to develop better infrastructure and establish long range plans for the future of Lansing.

The path that led Tony to the Mayor office may have started in church. As a man of faith, Tony believes in treating everyone with dignity and respect. He also learned the importance of serving both in the church and in your community. He has served as a teacher and an elder in previous churches. He said, "People of strong faith are often good leaders. I think faith has a bearing on how successful a person is. A person who is trying to do the right thing will typically do well."

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But there were other influences that helped him become a strong leader. He has a Bachelor degree from the University of South Dakota and a Masters Degree in Human Resource Management from Webster University. He also served as an officer in the Marine Corp for 24 years and that gave him lots of leadership experience. After retirement, he became a Government Service Civilian employee. When he was the Deputy Director of the Electronic Warfare Proponent he helped to develop detailed plans 10 to 15 years into the future. That experience has helped him forecast needs for Lansing.

Tony currently works full time as the Deputy Director, for the Army SHARP (Sexual Harassment/Assault Response and Prevention) Academy on Ft. Leavenworth. His position as mayor pays a very small stipend, but is mostly voluntary and demands a lot of his time, but he feels it is worth it to develop Lansing into a "city with a future". One of the things he likes about local politics is that change can be made without the party politics that larger scale government struggles with. He's currently working with developers and city leaders to bring positive economic growth to the city and to develop the infrastructure needed to support that growth.



Carla Wiegers began her term on the Lansing School Board in Jan. 2022. She said she ran because she wanted to model positive civic engagement to our children, youth and young adults. In her campaign, she used social media to recognize accomplishments and affirming stories of students in Lansing. And she walked door to door and listened to people talk about their impressions of our schools. Carla is finding that the election process was very different than functioning on the school board. It is even different from her military leadership experience. It is a much more collaborative experience where there are seven agendas and perspectives at play, "seven members on the Board, and each member has an equal vote." She said, "members must use all the research and information they can gather to positively influence the other leaders to consider action on the same issues that they see." She hopes to nurture honest discussion across the district about change and improving the school system, instead of just keeping the status quo. She said, "COVID has revealed that education can be delivered by many different methods. We need to empower our educators to employ the best ways to help

students learn and be academically and vocationally prepared for today's world and to help them set goals for their future. If we don't challenge our students, we rob them of discovering their full potential through problem solving and gaining grit to persevere."

One of the accomplishments of the new school board was the approval to go forward with a long term strategic plan to deliberately focus on establishing vision for the entire district. It will kick off in September and include input from administration, teachers, staff, parents, students and the community. Carla wants to make sure the school system strives to be fair and supportive to everyone and mindful of the resources provided by the community. One of her own agenda items is to encourage the adoption of capstone projects for seniors. She has admired this educational tool in other area school districts and has seen the benefits to students. "Eagle Scout projects, Girl Scout Gold Take Action projects and 4-H projects require youth to develop, research, and follow-through on a plan with community engagement and service. Why not adopt such a project at school to challenge all students?" For example, Carla explained that a senior project could involve job shadowing with local partnering businesses in the community, leadership, career experience or a creative endeavor. Students would demonstrate research techniques, presentation skills, and by completing the project, would gain confidence to tackle projects beyond high school.

Carla has had a lot of experience working with the school district and with kids. She served as a Site Council leader for the school district for many years. She has worked with Girls Scouts for many years, and she often substitute teaches in area schools. She has also had experience working with kids through our church. She has been a youth sponsor, Sunday School teacher and a mission trip chaperone. When I asked her how her faith has most influenced her time on the School Board, she said, "Service to others and striving to make decisions infused with integrity is an important part of the process. I want to model positive life skills for both students and adults and improve student outcomes. I hope to help cultivate sustainable change to influence solid policy to create an environment that nurtures our children and youth to grow into productive adults who will positively contribute to our community and world."

Loving our Neighbors as ourselves

April 24 was Blue Sunday, a day of prayer for neglected and abused children. Deborah Liles, the volunteer coordinator for CASA visited with me about how they are helping children in Leavenworth and Atchison county.

CASA stands for Court Appointed Special Advocates. A judge actually assigns a child a CASA volunteer when they feel the child has been abused or neglected and needs someone to be the child's eyes and ears while the child is in the judicial system. Judge Wiley said, "Services CASA provides to the domestic court are necessary, generally invaluable, and difficult if not impossible to replace."


There are 3 different types of volunteers through the CASA program. The first type is the CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocate). This position requires 30 hours of specialized training over an eight week period. A CASA volunteer works with the child they are assigned by attending court dates, meeting with foster care agencies, working with the Kansas Department for Children and Families, keeping records for use by the court. Currently there are 23 CASA volunteers in Leavenworth and Atchison county. Last year, those volunteers worked over 5,000 hours, so the need for more volunteers to help is great.

The second type of volunteer needed at CASA is the Child Exchange and Visitation Center monitors. They provide a safe environment for children and parents to visit. These volunteers need 15 hours of training. Our counties monitored 119 children last year.

The third type of volunteers does not require training and it involves helping in the office or with fund raisers or special events. Speaking of fund raisers....CASA will hold a fund raiser on May 6, called Nite at the Races at the Riverfront Community Center. They will also hold a Super Hero Fun Run on August 27.

CASA also offers three parenting classes to our community. General Responsibilities for Separating Parents (GRASP) is a class that may be court mandated for parents who need strategies to raise their children through the divorce process. Love and Logic: Adults Supporting Youth with Challenging Pasts is often a court mandated class for children with a traumatic past when the child is transitioning back into the home. Parenting in the Twenty First Century is a class that helps parents and caregivers focus on the different dynamics of the family structure. This class may be court mandated, but is also available to the general public.

One final way CASA serves the children of Leavenworth and Atchison is by hosting an Open Closet for families in need of clothing, toys and household items on June 7. If you are in need of items, you must make an appointment to "shop" the closet at the CASALVKS.ORG. If you would like to donate new clothes or toys or household items, they can be dropped off at the CASA office on Tuesdays between 10:00 AM - 6:00 PM or you can call to make an appointment to bring items. They do not accept stuffed animals.




Matthew Preston is graduating from Leavenworth High School. He plans to go to community college or possibly the military. He enjoyed how welcoming the church was when they first came here.
