



In their suffering, they left us wisdom on how to achieve the goal of a holy and righteous life. James is "rubber meets the road" practice of Christianity. I encourage you to read the letter each week of October. It's short and will speak to you in profound ways. Highlights of the month include:

October 2 - One service at 10:00 am to dedicate the new incline sidewalk. After focusing on hospitality for the month of September, it will be great to welcome everyone through the front doors.

October 9 - United as One event focusing on "Conquering the Complexities". How do we interact with people of other races and ethnicities? What does the Church and the Bible have to say about it? Join us and other churches from the Leavenworth area here on our green space from 4-6 pm to worship, listen, praise and grow as a follower of Jesus.

October 16 - Global Hope representatives will join us for both services. They are the mission organization that has created a Christian home for Ukrainian orphans in Romania. These twenty-eight children are war refugees as well as orphans. See how you can help with prayers, financial support, and letters of encouragement as God parents. Perhaps a mission trip could be in the works to go and see them next year?

October 30 - Nurture and Care will come into focus as we look at how we care for one another. Our congregational care team and nurture team do so much to serve others in our church. Find out some of their story and how you might be called to care for our neighbors whether they are church family or someone you know.

October 31 - Fall Festival is our opportunity to connect with kids from our church and community. Nancy Shade and her team are already working to make this event a special time. Just Playin' Around

Mike Mix played three different roles in the cast of Theater Atchison's production of "Matilda" in September. This is his sixth role in Community theater in Atchison and Leavenworth. Most recently he played the Knight in "Little Women". Prior to that he performed the part of Pulitzer in "Newsies" at Theater Atchison. For River City Community Players (RCCP) in Leavenworth, he played the sheriff in "All Shook Up", the Jewish husband in "It Should have been You" and Colonel Gilroy in "Something's Afoot". Unfortunately "Something's Afoot" was scheduled to play when COVID broke out in 2020 and so the production was canceled.

Mike said, "I never thought I would be doing theater in retirement. I thought I would be fishing." But the theater found him. Several years

ago, the RCCP was looking for an accompanist. Tyler Boehmer was unavailable, so he recommended Jan, Mike's wife. She agreed and the director asked Mike if he would play a male lead in the play since his wife was going to be at all the rehearsals anyway. Mike agreed and his theater career began. He found that there is a shortage of older men to play roles in community theater, so directors kept calling him for new shows. Mike really enjoys working with the younger actors and actresses. He said, "It is incredible to work with the young kids. Their energy level and talent is off the charts."

Mike does come from a talented family. His mother was an English teacher at Allen County Community College in Iola, Kansas and was active in their community theater. He hears you and invites you to come to Him for comfort.

If you are grieving the loss of a loved one, now is the perfect time to join GriefShare. We began with session one in September. There is still room for you in our group. Widowed spouses meet on the third and fifth Tuesday of every month from 2-4 pm. Shared experiences create a bond of understanding and credibility that forges friendships. Our group for everyone who is experiencing grief meets on the second and fourth Wednesdays from 5-7 pm. It's a place of safety where people can speak with candor and authenticity. Please consider joining us, especially if your grief is overwhelming you and is interfering with your ability to enjoy life. I believe that GriefShare is one of the tools that God has given us to help us through this challenging time.





65% feel their family is in a glass house



October is breast cancer awareness month, so you are going to start seeing pink. Schedule a mammogram, it could save your life. A regular mammogram, 22 years ago, discovered a cancerous lump in my breast. Since it was found early, stage one, no chemotherapy was needed. This even led to further events for me as nine months later stage four ovarian cancer was discovered. Surgery and chemo-

therapy followed. A genetic test indicated I am positive for the BRCA1 mutation. People who inherit harmful variants in one of these genes have increased risks of several cancers—most notably breast and ovarian cancer. Speak to your health care provider to determine when you should begin regular mammograms. Early diagnosis is important. It could be life saving! YOU are important, and this is too. When you see pink, schedule an appointment.

Relay for Life is a team fundraising event dedicated to helping the American Cancer Society attack cancer from every angle. October 8, starts with the Survivor's Dinner at 5 pm. Any cancer survivor is welcome to attend the dinner, they just need to RSPV at relay.org/leavenworthcoks. The opening ceremony is at 6 pm. They will walk around the track at Berkel Stadium which will be decorated with luminaries honor those who've



faced the disease and provide hope for a world without cancer. Luminaries can be purchased for \$10 to honor the memory of a loved one. The relay is an amazing way for communities to team up and make a real difference.

Every dollar raised supports the American Cancer Society's. They are still accepting teams and individuals who want to participate. Even a donation of \$10 can help people find hope and support online through the Cancer Survivors Network. Twenty five dollars can connect someone with a Reach to Recovery mentor. Thirty dollars can provide answers through their 24 hour helpline. 1-800-277-2345. Sixty five dollars can provide one free night of lodging for people with cancer when their treatment is far from home.


He definitely has a hand in the amazing connections our clinic has with the Shelter of Hope, Council on Aging, and The Guidance Center to work together to assist our patient population.
