One of the old sayings that I used during my coaching and teaching days is one I am sure you are familiar with: "You get out of it what you put into it." Students who worked hard in class to learn and



participated with a sense of purpose succeeded. Players who worked to achieve the most from their talent did well in the long run. While they might not have been the most talented players, they were usually the most consistent and reliable players because, as a coach, you knew they would give their best every practice and game.

The attitude is really a Biblical concept of you harvest what you plant. If you sow sparingly, you reap a small crop. If you plant generously, your harvest will be greater. (2 Corinthians 9:6). How is your planting going during our Lenten season? Are you sowing love for an even greater harvest? How is the listening plan going? I have found that digging into God's word through the Gospels is encouraging to me. What about inviting others to church or listening deeply to another person as a source of evangelism?

How are you doing with giving up pride, anger or critical/condemning attitudes toward others? Remember, you don't see the fruit of the planting right away. Growth takes time. When things are happening under the surface, or inside of us, we don't always see immediate results. That doesn't mean God isn't working on you. God is putting grace and Holy Spirit power into you as a believer in Jesus. You will get good fruit out of it. No root – no fruit. You get out of it what you put into it. That is truth whether in the classroom, ball field, farm field or discipleship! Good planting!! Pastor Dave



Grief Share is a friendly, caring group of people who will walk alongside you through one of life's most difficult experiences. You don't have to go through the grieving process alone.

For some people, a holiday (St Patrick's, Easter, Mother's Day, etc.) is about celebrating a loving relationship or enjoying lighthearted times with friends and family. But for those grieving the loss of a spouse, dealing with a divorce or break-up, facing a long-term separation, living in stressful circumstances, or otherwise feeling alone, these usually sweet holidays can have a bitter taste.

Here are a few tips for reaching out with care to someone who is struggling during a holiday, or at any time.

- \* Listen between the lines. If someone makes a comment about that hints at feelings of sadness or negativity, gently and nonjudgmentally follow up. A simple "Tell me more about that" lets them know you're willing to listen.
- \* Treat the person's feelings seriously. People may experience a variety of difficult emotions on during a holiday event. Treating their feelings as valid gives them permission to share whatever they need and want to share.
- \* Avoid clichés. There are plenty of clichés out there, so be on guard. Saying something like "God has someone for you" or "You'll find another" or "next year will be better" will likely only add to their difficult feelings about the holiday.
- \* Don't pressure someone to "cheer up." Trying to push someone to "get into the spirit of the holiday" often leaves them feeling worse and communicates that they shouldn't feel the way they do. Whether someone is sad or lonely, bitter or angry, a better approach is to be a caring, listening presence.

No matter the person's situation, your care can make a real difference. People may not think about those for whom a holiday isn't a particularly happy time, so your willingness to relate with compassion may be a welcome surprise for someone expecting to suffer silently.

## CONGREGATIONA



Congregational care is a core element of pastoring. It's a part of who you are (identity) and what you do (calling). We are ALL called to be congregational caregivers. As an attendee of this church, we are each an under-shepherd of Jesus.

Said another way, Pastor Dave is not the head of this church. Jesus is the head of the Church. I don't mean for this to sound brazen. Instead, I want to emphasize that Jesus is the leader of his Church and that he takes care of his people through Pastor and through each and every one of us. Practically speaking, you and I are to care for this church in a way that reflects Jesus' care. Not only are we an under-shepherd, but God has called us to shepherd his people (1 Pet 5:2). God personally etched this responsibility directly into your job description.

It's impossible for one person to provide all of the congregational care. The Bible doesn't support this belief, and it's practically impossible for any single human being to provide care to a large group of people.

Let's say we have 75 church members. Let's say Pastor Dave decides to spend 30 minutes with everyone—every week. In this example, this means he will spend 37.5 hours per week keeping in touch with church members, hearing what's going on in their lives, and helping them to live and love like Jesus. Add this on top of his other duties, and you have a recipe for a 100-hour workweek. Sure, he might be able to maintain this for a few weeks without burning out. But that's not the point I'm trying to make. What I'm saying is that pastors should care for their people - but not entirely by themselves.

As a pastor, Dave will always be in a position to provide care. But as he aims to tend to the needs of your church, he'll need to rely on a congregational care ministry- and that's where we come in. I will close by asking you to pray about this concept and where you might fit in it, and Part 2 of this article with practical suggestions will appear in next month's LIFE at FUMC Magazine.

Greetings to all. The month of March is a time of rebirth in our congregation and community while we spring into the season of new life as winter passes. With this new season we turn our attention to bringing God's Kingdom through ministries and events for the Lenten season culminating in the celebration of the resurrection. Please read your bulletins, emails and texts so we are all prepared for the upcoming events and celebrations.

Additionally, your church trustees are hard at work continuing to execute programs for the revitalization and renewal of our historical church property. Over the past four years they have stewarded construction, renovation and maintenance endeavors to include:

- \* Refurbishing Fellowship Hall and the main church kitchen
- \* Roof repair and resurfacing to the main church and education buildings
- \* HVAC replacement and repair
- \* Main church stone revitalization
- \* New front entrance for the main church
- \* Angled parking and new sidewalks around the green space
- \* Westside parking lot improvements thank you Tinklers
- \* Thousands of dollars of small continuous maintenance repairs

Almost all of these projects focused on the external infrastructure and improvements to maintain our facility for decades to come. To date these improvements cost \$704,164. Thanks to your generosity and giving these projects were paid in full with no debt to the church – amen.

We now turn our focus to the interior of the church. The projects are divided into two phases. Phase 1 which is fully funded by this year's budget which includes immediate repairs, the roof leak into the Wesley Hall bathroom and the replacement of the 75-gallon hot water heater that services the kitchen. The fire alarm system upgrade is a regulatory and safety requirement. The water fountain replacements will provide a water bottle filler feature that is more economical and healthy. Phase 1 is listed below.

Project "Estimated Cost"

Phase 1 fully funded by the 2023 church budget

Roof repair Wesley Hall \$6,275, to be completed as the weather permits

Fire system/security lights upgrade \$9,100, to be completed when the materials become available

Hot water heater \$3,200, to be completed this month Water Fountains \$2,000, to be completed this month

Phase 2 projects are listed below and we are hoping to raise the funds and complete them over the next two years. As costs continue to rise, the estimated price tag may also.

Phase 2 Years 2023-2024

Front Doors \$35,000 - this includes ADA compliant access

Alteration to the Altar Area \$20,000 – faux stone behind the cross to enhance the sanctuary

Lift to replace lights/cross \$2,000 – in conjunction with the altar alteration

Kitchen remodel and floor repair \$20,000 – includes new counter tops and a poured epoxy floor

Education Building Main Roof \$10,000 – aluminum coating

HVAC replacement 2 of 7 \$51,500 – we have 16 total units, these are reaching expiration

West-side doors refurbishment \$5.000 – re-veneer the doors

Old Office Ramp \$25,000 – removal and replace with stairs
Ed. Building Bathrooms upstairs \$10,000 – fixture and tile replacement
Carpet \$10,000 – as directed by trustees

All of these improvements fall outside of our normal operating budget. Mike Mix, Trustee Chair, will begin doing videos outlining these projects in more detail. Here is the my big ask:

We also thanked the greater United Methodist Church for including the Scouting Programs in the Book of Discipline. Key topics we discussed were that the Scouting Ministry had another successful year and is a thriving part of the youth ministry. The adults in the Scouting Ministry are value focused as we are fully invested in helping our youth find a path to a productive life. This year FUMC was able to recognize Bob Landzettel with the United Methodist Church Cross and Flame Award. In the Scouting Ministry, as the Charter Organizational Representative, I focus on scouts growing an understanding of what it means to be Reverent. Our Scouts are focused more on fun and, for some, advancement.

Scouts worked to build a fire pit in the green space. It is there for the church use as well as Scouting Ministry activities. We plan to use it to retire US flags each year. That night Ed Garven came by just to check on the scouts.

Summer Camps will be keeping everybody busy. We have to thank the Tinkler Trustees for any support they can provide in helping families make the payments.

Monday before Valentine's Day, the Cub Scouts of Pack 3109 made valentine crafts and they are designing their cars for the Pinewood Derby next month. After spring break some of the Webelos will cross over to begin the next step in the Scouting Ministry. In the next month, the Cub Scouts are looking at some weather safety instruction.

March 6, we'll be meeting early at 6 pm at the Justice Center for a special tour arranged by Ms. Decker. This is a great opportunity for our Cub Scouts to see our community in action. Thanks so much for making this happen for us! March 27, the Emergency Management department will be joining us at the church activity building giving a presentation on flood and tornado safety for the beginning of spring.

We are tentatively looking at Pinewood Derby at the end of March and will hold a car cutting workshop to help anyone who does not have the power tools to cut their cars themselves. We'll publish those dates soon.

Two of our more experienced Scouts, Esa Lozoya and Henry Chaar, have volunteered to support the Orphanage Mission Trip. They have both started the Passport process and will continue with meetings. They are excited to be part of the FUMC youth program.

I started working at the shelter in 2018, not too long after our family moved to Leavenworth. The church needed spots filled for the night shift, and I was a late night person. I wanted to do some volunteering, and the shelter of hope seemed like an easy way to volunteer. It turned out to be a long term engagement. I worked at the shelter up until I went off to school in the fall of 2022. The time commitment was very doable. Once a month for a few hours was an easy way to insert some community work into my schedule.

I started out working the late night to early morning shift. It was always very quiet, and basically the only interactions I had with the guests were when someone got up to use the restroom. Doing laundry and glancing at security cameras from time to time was work that may seem simple, but those acts provide security and shelter for members of our community that need some extra help. In doing them, it helped fill my spirit.

I moved to the first shift at some point in 2020. I enjoyed the new experience of interacting with the people as they came through to pick up their bedding and clothes. It fills a need for people right here in my home community, and it is always a good reminder to see the people, not just look at them in passing.

One of the most valuable lessons I've learned is to just see people as people. The guests at the shelter are really not too different from myself, and if, for whatever reason, I find myself in need of a safe place to sleep, I hope people will be working at the shelter.

There are many ways to volunteer at the Community of Hope. They need volunteers to answer the phone and people to drive clients to grocery stores and doctor appointments. They also need day center monitors and people who will help provide a meal for guests. They also work with professionals to help provide health services and informational classes. 


# MCGhim to Stitch

### Mission trip in paradise

The One Love Medical Mission resumed operations following a two year absence due to the pandemic and traveled to the St. Andrews and St. Mary's parishes in the Blue Mountains of Jamaica on January 21 - 30, 2023. Rick and Shari Hansen, from our church family went on this mission trip. The One Love Medical Mission has been in existence for more than 40 years and is supported by the Community Christian Church in Kansas City and other organizations such as the Leavenworth Rotary Club. It provides much needed medical care to the Jamaican people. The team is lead by Rotarian, Dr. Larry Evans, retired oral maxillofacial surgeon, and his wife Gayle Wood, a Pediatric Nurse



Practitioner, and consists of several doctors, nurse practitioners, nurses, pharmacists and support staff. By partnering with the local Jamaican churches and medical personnel, the team is able to set up pop up medical clinics at area churches and schools and provide no cost medical care to the Jamaicans.

Every year, the One Love Medical Mission has 30 team members. Each team member travels at their own expense to Jamaica and works in the medical clinics for four days, fulfilling a role either as a medical professional or support staff to assist the team in delivering health care. Donated medical supplies are transported by team members to Jamaica. The team arrives at the Montego Bay airport on Saturday, clears customs, and then loads up two busses with all the medical supplies and personal bags brought by the team, and enjoys a 3 ½ hour bus ride to Tapioca Village. The Sinclairs, owners of Tapioca Village Resort, are ready to accommodate the team for the week as they provide sleeping rooms, meals, laundry services, storage; everything the mission team needs. The Resort is sort of rustic in appearance and you may not always have a hot shower, but the beds are comfy and the Jamaican food is wonderful!

On Sunday, the team wakes up to a delicious, hot breakfast and then dresses to go to Church services in town. Since each bus accommodates half of the team, the team is split so some attend Oberlin Church Services and the others attend services in Castleton. Rick and I attended the services in Castleton and it happened to be the Sunday when the services were lead by the women of the church. We enjoyed lots of singing and praise music, scripture readings, a sermon, as well as a dedication of a new baby. We were warmly welcomed to Jamaica by the pastor and the people of the church. They are so appreciative and thankful for the team and all the care they provide while in Jamaica and you can't help but feel the love on Sunday morning! Church in Jamaica lasts pretty much all day but the Team must depart after about three hours as there is much work to be done at Tapioca Village to prepare for the upcoming clinics.

Back at Tapioca Village, we change to work clothes and enjoy lunch. We then head to the packing area to locate and organize our supplies for the clinic. We do a lot of pill counting on Sunday afternoon! Many of the over the counter prescriptions are counted out into smaller quantities so that they can be quickly dispensed at the clinics. This makes everything faster and more efficient on clinic days which I really appreciated as I worked in the pharmacy this year and that is a very busy, fast paced job! At the end of packing, tubs of supplies are labeled and readied for loading onto the busses the next morning. The team assignments are also posted on the bulletin board on Sunday night. That way everyone knows what their team assignment and job will be for the next day and which bus they must get on in the morning!

The mornings begin early with breakfast and devotions by one or more of the team members. Gayle also gives a morning briefing and the run down for the day, plus announces when the busses will leave. On Monday, one bus goes to Oberlin and the other goes to Castleton and then on Tuesday the teams switch places. These two locations have the largest number of patients to be seen. Dr. Evans, the "tooth puller", is with my team that goes to Oberlin on Monday and then Castleton on Tuesday. His wife Gayle, the Pediatric ARNP, does the opposite on those days. Dr. Evans travels with an assistant and someone to sterilize the instruments as well as a traffic controller. Rick Hansen served as Dr. Larry Evans traffic controller, checking the patients in to get screened and receiving a numbing agent if there was a tooth to be pulled. Then while they were getting numb, he brought in another set of patients to be screened and numbed up, then rotates those that are ready for teeth pulling back to Dr. Evans for extraction. Dr. Evans is a very popular man on these trips and works very long hours because, unfortunately, many Jamaicans do not get regular dental care and having a tooth pulled is their only relief from pain. The rest of the Medical Mission Team is evenly split so each location is represented by physicians, ARNPs, nurses, and support staff. For example, the pharmacist was on my team and I (Shari Hansen) served as his pharmacy tech, but the other team also has pharmacy services provided by two nurses.

Brian and Kari Anderson were also surprised to have twins, but since Anya and Jonas are their only children, it's the only way they know to parent. Kari said, "We learn everyday for sure. We all make mistakes, and we learn from them." She also said, "We enjoy taking pictures to see the growth of the kids. Appreciate every day; it's a blessing."

Anya said, "No twin telepathy unfortunately, but if we're hanging out with friends and something is funny or goes wrong we can always tell just by a look. I think our personalities are very different, I tend to be more outgoing, while he is a bit quieter. But I think when we are together and it's just us we are pretty much the same person since we're used to each other." Jonas agreed.

When they were little Anya was being pulled in a wagon on a walk with her grandma. All of a sudden, Anya screamed and then stopped. Kari had taken Jonas to have surgery that day. According to the paperwork, it was the exact time when Jonas was undergoing surgery.

Kaelyn and Madison, are the granddaughters of Grant and Amy Zschoche. Twins do run in the gene pool on both sides of the families. Kaelyn and Madison have always been close and always relied on each other for that special sisterly support. Even now they are as lovingly close to each other as they were in the womb. Sarah was told Madison was laying on top of Kaelyn and she knew this to be true from the wrestling matches that were taking place! As infants, newborn feeding time was a trick to balance especially the every three hour schedule those first few weeks. Sometimes if one stirred you go ahead and start the feeding process knowing the other would soon be ready. Both crying was definitely a challenging task. Luckily there was lots of family who would pull shift duty to help with bathing, feeding and sitting!

Growing up the girls never liked to dress identical. They always preferred the same style but different colors. It was the same but only different mentality! Now, they are constantly swapping clothes, sometimes with a little bribery in the mix; staying up late for those catch up talks from the events of the day; or just hanging out watching a movie to be in each other's company. They are the best of friends.

In second grade, they decided to try and see how far their twin uniqueness would take them and plotted a plan to switch classes to see if the teacher would notice! It didn't last long as the teacher remembered what clothing one had worn that day!

Each team also has two "drug runners" who take the scripts out to the patients and explain to the patient how to take their prescriptions. Each team also is set up with personnel to provide patient triage, patient visits (evaluations by physicians or ARNPs), conduct lab testing such as urinalysis, blood sugar testing, pregnancy testing, nebulizer treatments and ear lavages. Each team also provides eye screenings and issues reading glasses to those that need this assistance for reading their bibles, etc.

On Wednesday and Thursday, the work continues as we hold clinics at Salisbury Plain, Manning Hill, and Buff Bay locations. These days are also very busy, long days and have a large following of Jamaicans that come annually to take advantage of this care. The One Love Medical Mission team strives to offer the same services at all locations, making sure that supplies and medications are spread evenly between the sites. While One Love Medical Mission team is allowed to prescribe medications for a period of only 30 days, it does work in partnership with local medical personnel. Dr. Reed from Kingston assists in the ongoing care of patients and in referring patients when they need additional care in their area after the team leaves.

On Friday morning, the team has a farewell breakfast celebration, reflecting on all that was accomplished that week and all the friendships that were formed. We also said our good byes to the Tapioca Village staff and presented them with gifts and tips for all the support and care they provided for the week. We then sorted supplies and medications that will remain in storage in Oberlin and determined what was available to donate to the local clinics. Many medications have an expiration date before the next trip or are in unsealed containers and therefore are donated so they can be administered by local medical personnel to those in need. On Friday afternoon, the team departed Tapioca Village and goes by bus to Montego Bay for a couple nights at the Rose Hall Hilton as a reward for a job well done. For some of us, this was our first hot shower since arriving in Jamaica and was much appreciated!

To put in perspective the work accomplished by the Mission Team, I am including the following statistics:

Pharmacy: 4,123 prescriptions filled 486 worm treatments

Eyeglasses: 987 Ear Lavages: – 98

Urinalysis tests: 63 Blood Sugar testing: 217
Pregnancy Tests: 4 Nebulizers: 55 (also gave away 5)

Dental Patients: 250 Teeth extracted: 391 Dental Consults: 21
