

Four students from our church family went to Camp Chippewa this summer and they loved it so much they each went back for additional week! Camp Chippewa is located around Ottawa. It offers several types of camp at the same time. Faith and Fun camp offers canoeing, archery, go carts, water games, and other outdoor activities. Boots and Bible camp revolves around horses and trail riding. There are also camps that focus on STEM activities or the arts.

Annabelle Estep and Lucy and Natalie Heim all attended camp together; one session of Faith and Fun and one session of Boots and Bible. All the girls enjoyed both sessions of camp and they all loved riding horses. At Boots and Bible camp the girls got up early because they feed, water and saddle the horse they are going to ride before breakfast. They also groom their horse all week. Lucy's horse, Huntley, was very large and loved to stop and eat when they went for a ride. There was a different trail each day and the girls said they were beautiful.

Natalie said one of her favorite parts of camp were the counselors. She said they were so funny and kind. Speaking of counselors....Alexis Hoffman went to camp as a counselor in training. She did such a great job her first week, the camp asked her to come back two additional weeks as a counselor in training. Alexis worked with the Boots and Bible camp and she has lots of experience with horses because she owns her own horse. In addition to working with the horses and keeping the campers safe, Alexis helped to lead the music and even served Communion. Alexis' cousin Wyatt Van Zlike also went to camp two weeks with Alexis. Alexis would like to go back as a Counselor in training again next year because she said, "I made friends with other kids my age at camp and we still keep in touch."

The spiritual theme of this year's camp was "Fruit of the Spirit". When I asked the girls what they learned about God, Annabelle said, "I learned God will always be with me." I asked the girls if they would recommend camp to other kids. They all unanimously answered yes. Lucy said, "It's really fun and a great way to make friends and learn about God."


I will officially complete my leadership role as Executive Director of Global Hope at the end of the summer. In the meantime, we will continue to serve, share, and seek the best for our children.

Having said that, I have begun the process of downsizing. The last thing I want is to leave a houseful of useless clutter for my daughters to deal with. Having done this myself for both of my parents as well as both of Don's, I understand how emotionally draining and time consuming this process can be. As a gift to them, I intend to throw or give away as much as I can to spare them this additional burden during their time of grief.

There is one area in particular that I intend to declutter. I realize that during my seventy plus years on this earth, I (like you?) have accumulated my share of hurt feelings, perceived injustices, emotional wounds, and trauma to last a lifetime. I need to clean out my spiritual closet and learn to forgive. We learn in GriefShare that not forgiving others can manifest itself in physical illness, irrational outbursts, anger, and prolongs the grieving process. It can negatively effect our relationships with others.

An example of this might be your inability to forgive the doctor who made a wrong decision that hastened your loved one's death. Or perhaps you have been betrayed by a spouse or best friend. God's word tells us that He forgives us, therefore we need to forgive others. This doesn't mean that they are absolved of accountability or consequences. In fact the person you are forgiving may not feel any regret, or may have already died themselves. Forgiveness is for your benefit.

We need to have a clear understanding of how God has forgiven us. We don't deserve forgiveness, we also hurt others, we disobey, we love other things more than Him. If we accept God's forgiveness, how can we refuse to extend it to someone else? It means letting go of past hurts. Know that God cares for you and invites you to find comfort in Him and in the fact that one day He will put an end to all suffering and punish all injustice.

If you or someone you know are experiencing grief, Grief Share might be for you. It's a support group where you can share with others and learn coping strategies through videos, homework, and discussion. Please consider joining us. Grief Share is a friendly, caring group of people who will walk alongside you through one of life's most difficult experiences. You don't have to go through the grieving process alone. Stellar VBS By The Numbers

How was VBS this year Nancy? I'm so glad you asked!

As advertised, it was "STELLAR"! We had:

- 81 Kids registered (15 were unable to come due to illness or travel)
- 45 Volunteers during the week
- 54 Kids on our highest day of attendance

But these numbers are just the beginning of the story...

When divided up into categories: 6 of the kids (9%) come to FUMCL regularly, 16 of the kids (24%) had some kind of family connection to FUMCL or have been to a previous VBS which leaves 44 kids (67%) that we did not have contact with before VBS! Many are new to Ft. Leavenworth, some are long-time Leavenworth residents.



That's really awesome! But these numbers just tell one small part of the story of VBS. We were also able to shine Jesus' light for our community and our world through our mission projects for the week. Our monetary donations are designated to send Bibles in their native language to countries around the world, partnering with World Vision. Our goal for the week was 20 Bibles at \$12 each. Because of the generosity of the kids and of our amazing congregation, we raised \$600! Enough to send 50!!! Yep! That's over double our goal! We also requested food donations for local food banks.

We received 64 boxes of cereal/oatmeal, 49 jars of peanut butter, 20 jars of jelly, 87 packages of dry pasta, and 58 jars of pasta sauce for Trinity House and Stronghold Food pantries!

There were also a LOT of seeds planted for God's Kingdom. While we may not see the fruition, we do know the seeds were planted and are confident that God will continue to work in the lives of both the participants and all the leaders and helpers. Shouts of "SHINE JESUS' LIGHT!" filled the Sanctuary, the Fellowship Hall, and the Education Building throughout the week. During the closing on Thursday, you could have heard a pin drop as we went through the story of Jesus making sure his mother would be taken care of – even while he was suffering on the cross. I sat down next to our Jesus to tell him thank you. When I invited any children who wanted to do the same to come up, almost EVERY CHILD came up! They patiently waited in a straight line in the center of the aisle to have their turn with Jesus! One little girl told her mom as they were leaving for the day, "Mommy! I got to hug Jesus today!" Amen.

Thank you to all our volunteers! We couldn't have VBS without you!
