# First United Methodist church







In 1896, Charles Sheldon wrote a book set in a fictional town of Raymond, KS. The setting was a church congregation that decided they would live a year by answering the question, "What would Jesus do?" Each week, the story was told by releasing a new chapter using various characters from the story. I'll bet Mr. Sheldon never could have imagined his book would be one of the best-selling Christian stories of all time with over fifty million copies sold worldwide and people still using his question today. For this fall, I'm using a variation of WWJD for our worship themes. Instead of "What would Jesus do," I'm focusing on what Jesus DID. This approach takes us back to scripture in order to pattern our behavior and values based on Gospel stories and the Master himself. Here's the lineup:

- Desus invited all to the table.
- I Jesus valued people.
- I Jesus offered mercy.
- I Jesus forgave sinners.
- I Jesus healed the broken.
- Jesus prayed to the Father.
- I Jesus served others.
- I Jesus worked intentionally.
- I Jesus called disciples to follow.


So many times, we get caught up on what experts and authors tell us about Jesus that we forget to use the **Bible as our foundation. I'm not saying the thoughts and opinions of others aren't helpful. What I am** encouraging each of us to do is start with the Gospel stories and then work our way to broader conversations of Jesus. Tell the Good News of the Savior. This practice causes me to do three things

intentionally:

- 1. Ask why did he do it?
- 2. How did he do it?
- 3. What might that look like for us?

I hope you'll come along for the ride this fall. Perhaps when we understand what Jesus did, we'll be able to live out a commitment to live as Jesus did. Disciples across the generations start with Jesus!

## **New Beginnings with New Leadership**

We are so delighted to have Alexa Decker assume the responsibilities of Pack 3109 Chairperson. Pack leadership has spent hours visiting elementary school inviting families to check out Cub Scouts. The first meeting was Tuesday, August 22. Due to competing activities for youth and leaders Cub Scouts are

switching their meeting times to Tuesdays, at least through soccer season!

The Troops (173/6173) are finishing up merit badge requirements from summer camp. And now we have started working on Citizenship in the Community. We had an honest discussion with the scouts about what it means to be a good citizen in their communities ... School, sports, band, Scouts, church. We talked about the Scout Laws - Trustworthy, Loyal, Reverent and being the cornerstones of what good citizenship looks like to others. We are gearing up for school, sports, and the dreaded re-charter with annual Scouts BSA program. You may recall last year the difficult time when the BSA and the court system recognized abuses of youth for decades past. This year BSA sent out a request for insurance agencies to bid for the BSA insurance business. Only one company responded. The increase in fees this year are for increased insurance fees. What you see is that it is expensive for a family to participate in the Scouting Ministry, and we have families with three youth and one adult, which runs it up to nearly \$500.

Effective August 1, 2023, the BSA will implement the following national membership fees: YOUTH: \$119 total

- \$80 for Cub Scouts, Scouts BSA, Venturing and Sea Scouting participants (\$5 increase)
- \$39 Heart of America Council Fee. (no increase in fees)
- \$25 one-time joining fee for new program participants in Cub Scouts, Scouts BSA, Venturing and Sea Scouting (Not prorated and no change in fee).

### ADULT: \$99 total

\$60 for all adult volunteers (\$15 increase to provide general liability insurance and enhanced background checks) \$39 Heart of America Council Fee. (no increase in fees)

FUMC: \$100 for a unit charter/affiliation fee (no change in fee)

\$25 for Merit Badge Counselors (New Fee applies only for Merit Badge Counselors not already registered as

Trinity House is a local food pantry and clothing closet hosted by **TRINITY HOUSE** Trinity Lutheran church at 2101 10th Ave. With the closing of several local charities, Trinity House has seen an increase in need in Leavenworth. We have several church family members who volunteers there and they have made us aware of some of the needs.

They are almost out of clothes for school kids, all sizes. They have no food on their give-away table. These are dry pantry items such as cereal, pasta, spaghetti sauce, peanut butter, jelly, crackers, canned soup, etc. They are out of freezer foods such as chicken nuggets, burritos, lunch meats, etc. They are also out of dish soap, detergent, all toiletries such as soap, shampoo, deodorant, and toilet paper.

Trinity House is open for donations Tuesday through Thursday from 10 am to 1 pm. If you have questions about what they need, you can call (913)682-7474.



Randy Jessen, the Executive Director of Global Hope, Scott French, the Director of Generosity and Ruth Wanja all came to share their testimonies of how Global Hope started and how they are rescuing orphans in Romania, Kenya and India. There was a fund raising banquet for Global Hope Godparents on Saturday and on Sunday, Randy Jessen told us the story of how his family adopted a daughter and a granddaughter from an orphanage in Romania in the early 1990s. Those adoption experiences led to the creation of Global Hope that now helps hundreds of orphans in three continents.

At the Night of Inspiration, Ruth Wanja shared her testimony. She was born in Kenya. Her mother died from HIV/ AIDS when she was eight years old. She and her siblings were taken in by elderly grandparents, but they were not financially capable of caring for the children. Ruth used to collect metal from garbage dumps to get money for food for her siblings and herself. Through the grace of God, the children were discovered by Christine, the director of Hope for Orphans Rescue and Education Center (HOREC). She took them into her care. Ruth finally had food to eat and a school to attend. She grew into a beautiful young woman alongside her 35 HOREC "siblings". Ruth is currently a student at College of the Ozarks where she majors in biomedical engineering and chemistry. Wyatt Brown shared his testimony of how the mission trip to Romania changed his life. The fund raising dinner raised over \$11,000 for the orphanages. Thank you for your caring support.

Our church family has several Godparents who support a Ukrainian child in Nehemiah House in Romania every month. They pray for their child and they can write letters to their child. If you are interested in more information about Global Hope, you can visit their website: Globalhope.org.

I love the two service Sundays! If you cannot attend in person, join online.

First, the temporal side of the house: Thank you to all you good and faithful servants that share so generously with your treasures.

Second, the staff update: A huge thank you to Rhonda York, Jan Mix, Cindy White and Marsha Gaffin for providing beautiful organ and piano music during our services. A special acknowledgement to Sandy Wood, Libby Frashier, Kathi LaMoe, Mary Lou Anderson, Marti Crow and Marsha Gaffin for the continuing love and devotion they show and deliver every Monday afternoon in the AIR dementia ministry.

Third, last month, Pastor Dave conducted a number of home meetings to fellowship in small groups and to garnish the views and desires of the congregation as we move towards 2024. Based on those discussions and recommendations the church council will start defining our church focus for the upcoming year. Please pray for our lay leaders as they faithfully guide our church ministries towards fulfilling His Kingdom in our community in 2024. Michelle Briggs (Church Lay Leader), Carla Wiegers (Church Council Chair), Marti Crow (Church Finance Chair), Carole Hoffman (Church SPRC Chair), Kathi LaMoe (Witness Lead), Scouter Bill Kidder (Nurture Lead), and Mike Mix (Church Trustee Chair).

Mike Mix, the Trustee Chair, is responsible with his team of five; to evaluate, plan, and implement strategies to maintain and improve the physical assets of the church. Many of the comments from the home meetings dealt with alterations and additions. Mike and his team have already held a preliminary meeting to address the alteration of the "gold torn cloth" behind the altar cross, as well as a host of immediate and long term restoration and improvement projects. In the last month they have approved and repaired the front entry way floor to prevent any future water damage (the concrete floor was heaving) and have repaired two exterior stained glass window frames that had rotted. The trustees work off a council approved plan that is ever changing based on immediate needs (the hot water heater failed) and available resources. For the remainder of 2023, the two main projects are the altar cloth and upgrading the fire system.

Over the past several years we have spent over \$700,000 on capital projects designed to improve and maintain this historic facility for decades to come. These projects included: stained glass refurbishment, the external stone refurbishment and replacement, repairing the roofs on both buildings, the sidewalk project around the green space, the new inclined sidewalk and front entry to the church, repair to the west-side parking lot, the kitchen and Fellowship Hall renovation, the replacement of HVAC units, the fans in the sanctuary, the repair to the kitchen dishwasher, a new water heater, and countless smaller yet necessary repairs and replacements.

Your trustees are continuously planning and executing ways to make our collective worship experience and expanded use of our facilities more accessible, in good lasting condition and aesthetically inviting. After hearing your responses to the old gold damaged burlap behind the sanctuary cross, bids are in process to take corrective action.

Financially the church remains strong. Your loving generosity makes Kingdom Building - loving our God and loving others through Christ Jesus - possible. Below is graph on where your offerings have been spent so far. Well over \$100,000 has been spent on loving and caring. Thank you all for making this possible. 
**Build relationships Make memories**



# BOOK SEPT. 26

The book club reads a variety of book genres. We're currently reading a non fiction book called, "Founding Mothers: The Women Who Raised Our Nation". Journalist Cokie Roberts' takes an intimate and illuminating look at the fervently patriotic and passionate women whose tireless pursuits on behalf of their families-and their country—proved just as crucial to the forging of a new nation as the rebellion that established it. While much has been written about the men who signed the Declaration of Independence, battled the British, and framed the Constitution, the wives, mothers, sisters and daughters they left behind have been little noticed by history. Drawing upon personal correspondence, journals, and even recipes, Roberts reveals the often surprising stories of these fascinating women, bringing to life the everyday trials and extraordinary triumphs of individuals like Abigail Adams, Eliza Pinckney, Catherine Littlefield Green, Esther DeBerdt Reed, and Martha Washington-proving that without our exemplary women, the new country might have never survived.


## Bible Study

Pastor Dave will be hosting a Tuesday night study this fall. Starting on September 5, they'll be reading the book, "The Good and Beautiful Life: Putting on the Character of Christ" by James Bryan Smith. It is the second of a trilogy on Christian discipleship but reading the first book isn't necessary. Here are some of the topics we'll be covering: Learning to live with anger, learning to live without lying, learning to live without worrying, learning to live without judging others. Our society has put so many unrealistic expectations on us. Did you know that in America, most corporations give no more than three days bereavement leave when you lose a loved one? That's not even enough time to plan a funeral, much less recover from your loss. And yet, we're expected after three days, to carry on as if nothing has happened?

The truth is, the death of someone you love and are close to changes the trajectory of your life. And it takes months, years, and sometimes decades to come to terms with it. We are urged to "move on", maybe our emotions make others uncomfortable, or you feel there is nowhere for you to be authentic about how you feel, so you bottle up your grief and carry on as if everything is fine.

But it's not. When people suppress their emotions, whether it's anger, grief, resentment, or unforgiveness, they tend to come out in other ways. Our bodies are not created to harbor these feelings. So when they erupt it's usually not in a good way. It may present as a health scare or high blood pressure. Or maybe an eruption of misdirected anger. Or an embarrassing torrent of tears over a trivial event. Whatever the situation, it's your body telling you that you need to deal with your grief.

We're all on this journey called life, and sooner or later we will all experience grief. When this happens, please consider professional counseling, or attending a group such as GriefShare. GriefShare is a safe place where others have experienced what you are going through. They won't think you are weird or overreacting. You can be honest and authentic about your sorrow without judgement. And best of all, you will learn how to cope with your feelings of loss.

I'm happy to let you know that the entire GriefShare curriculum has been revised and updated to reflect current events, such as Covid. If you have been hesitating, now is the perfect time to enroll. While each lesson is stand alone, it follows a progression that starts with the death of your loved one and continues on through recovery. We currently have two groups, one for spouses, and one for anyone experiencing grief. And we are in the process of creating an additional class which will be on line for those unable to attend in person. Please consider enrolling, and if you know anyone who would benefit from GriefShare, tell them about us. You'd be doing them a big favor. God's Blessings,

### How can we better support the teenagers in our lives?

I'm glad you asked! As sports and other activities inch their way further and further into the days and times that used to be reserved only for family and church, ministering to youth becomes more and more complicated. How can we reach teenagers if they're too busy to ever set foot in our church doors? When you're more likely to run into teenagers outside the walls of the church than inside, showing God's love to teens becomes an opportunity for each of us wherever we find ourselves. Here are some ways you can show love to the teenagers in your life, whether they are neighbors, grandkids, or family friends.

1. Show up for them. Teens are so busy today because they're often in a lot of extra-curricular activities. A huge way to show them love is to be present in their lives. Take an interest in their hobbies and extracurriculars and show up to support them at their events.

**2. "Adopt" a teen.** Even if you aren't related to the teens around you, you can always be a bonus parent, grandparent, aunt or uncle. So many of the families who live in our area are military and may be hundreds of miles away from the nearest family members. You can build a relationship for them so that they have family right here in Leavenworth.

**3. Treat them like they're smart, capable, and know what they're doing. I once read something that said to** speak to children as if they are the wisest, kindest, most beautiful and magical humans on earth, for what they believe is what they will become. That has stuck with me as I parent my own children, but I also think it applies to teenagers (or really anybody) as well. Repeatedly I've found that the youth in my youth group rise to the expectations that I set.

4. Approach teens with curiosity. It's pretty obvious that today's teenagers are a lot different than any other decade in the past. That has been true for every generation, but it's especially true now because technology means society changes even more rapidly than ever before. Youth today, by and large, are going to have different opinions, values, and interests than older generations and that's okay. They're growing up in a different world than we did with different opportunities and challenges. Rather than leading with judgment, lead with curiosity. You may not agree with their reasoning, but often they have something to teach us.

5. Share your life. Intergenerational relationships are fascinating. If you are open to sharing your stories and experiences to the teens around you, they can learn from you. It also humanizes you; you're not just somebody their parents' or grandparents' age but someone who has experienced different things, overcome struggles, and learned life lessons along the way.


6. Bring them to church! Our youth program is a community where students can take a break from their busy week and just be loved as they are. In a world that's complicated and hectic, it can be nice to have a soft place to land. Each week right after the second service (a little after noon), we meet in the youth room for lunch, a game, and a lesson.

As leaders, our goal is to make sure that our youth build a firm foundation of faith to carry them into adulthood and that they leave our program knowing that they are loved by their leaders and by God. We seek to equip them to **then spread God's love to others, too. You know, the whole Matthew 22:36-40 thing. SUNDAY SCHOOL WARYLON ANDERSON ROOM 101


The Cornerstone Sunday School class is starting a new Bible Study by Dr. David Jeremiah called, "A Life Beyond Amazing: Decisions That Will Transform Your Life Today". Dr. Jeremiah uncovers God's strategy for change and challenges you to make 9 important decisions that will transform your heart, your life, and your world. This life-changing book explores the nine qualities of character that carry us forward. The New Life Seekers Sunday School class will be studying "The Gospel of Mark: A Beginners Guide to the Good News" starting Sept. 24. Walk through the Bible's earliest source for the life of Jesus with author Amy-Jill Levine as she examines John the Baptizer, the Transfiguration, and several of Jesus's most notable stories and parables. The Good News of the gospel message comes alive in this book as readers see Jesus as divine and human, powerful and weak, approachable yet mysterious. The book features an in-depth study of select passages and illuminates the Gospel in its historical context and as a source for the other gospels. Donna Ramsey leads the group. They meet in room 203.

The Family Matters Sunday School class usually focuses on how to be an effective Christian parent and they are just finishing Paul David Tripp's book, "Parenting: 14 Gospel Principles That Can Radically Change Your Family". In October they will start "The Forgotten God: Reversing Our Tragic Neglect of the Holy Spirit". Author Francis Chan rips away paper and bows to get at the true source of the church's power the Holy Spirit. Chan contends that we've ignored the Spirit for far too long, and we are reaping the disastrous results. Thorough scriptural support and compelling narrative form Chan's invitation to stop and remember the One we've forgotten, the Spirit of the living God. New members are always welcome. They share breakfast together on the first Sunday of the month.




