The Wonderful Wednesday kids are rescuing "Paul" as he escapes from the walls of Damascus. All fall the Wonderful Wednesday kids are studying the life and journeys of the apostle Paul.





I don't know if you noticed when you go out to eat or shop in a store that an automatic tip calculator pops up. It has a button for ten percent, fifteen percent, or twenty percent. Sometime, there is a button for no tip. Tipping culture has become part of our experience where we can express generosity to our server or clerk who has done well. We are considered generous if we tip ten percent or more. Most people like to consider themselves generous or remember days when tipping was a big part of their income.

What if we took that same attitude toward Jesus and his Body, the Church? I often shake my head in disbelief when people will contribute more money to the waiter after a nice dinner out than give to their local church and the mission of Jesus. What is the disconnect between generosity in the marketplace and generosity in the church?

Unfortunately, I don't have the answer. Only you do. For some of you, this question is a non-starter because you are tithers and have given ten percent or more of your income for years. For others, we struggle to make ends meet because we spend too much on ourselves and leave the leftovers for God. Often, there isn't much left over. Furthermore, we have some in the church that distrust the pastor or leaders of the church and question whether "their money" is being spent well. I hope you don't fall into the last category.

Church staff and leaders work diligently to be generous in our community. We pay our staff fair and reasonable wages. We maintain our facility and ministries with responsible actions. I hope you believe that as a church, we are going in the right direction. As the pastor, I know that we don't have any control over what other churches do but we do influence this church. I believe we make a difference for Jesus Christ in the lives of many people and Leavenworth County.

When you receive your pledge card this month, here are a few things to consider as you commit yourself to Christ through your "prayers, presence, gifts, service and witness."

- If you gave to the church the same way you gave to your waiter or barista, how would it change your giving habits? How often do I press "no tip" with Jesus?
- What would have to grow in you to consider tithing (giving 10% to the church) as an act of generosity instead of an oppressive duty or expectation? Or, for you to consider adding another percentage or two to your existing giving habit?
- How is the lack of people's generosity an attitude of distrust? Do they really wonder if God will provide for their needs and many of their wants, too?

It takes all of us to do our share financially to provide for the ministries of First United Methodist Church of Leavenworth. When you consider that God is the giver of every good and perfect gift (James 1:17) saying thank you through generous giving seems a small act of gratitude. Thank you for all you are doing to bring Kingdom of God.

Where do I go from here? What's next? How can I get there?

These are all valid questions. In order for your pain to subside, you have to begin to reengage in life and move forward. Your loved one died, your life is forever changed. But you can't move through life by looking in the rear view mirror. You have to learn that your pain can coexist with peace.

Creating a different normal is key to your healing process. Keep your old life, but start to tweak it to change and adapt. Find other people to befriend and invest in. Don't look too far into the future, instead stay in the day as you live it. You can trust God to give you the resources to handle your new situation.

Always remember - it's okay to ask for help. The Bible clearly tells us to bear one another's burdens. By not accepting help, we are actually depriving someone else of receiving the blessing that helping us would bring them. But it's helpful if you know how to respond when people ask you how they can help you. You might make a list of the things that you need, then you'll have answers ready when the opportunity arises.

For example, if someone brings a meal, you might respond by saying "I'd love it if you could stay and eat it with me, I could use the company ", or "can you bring the kids when you come so that my kids can play with them a while?" Another example might be "do you think Jack could come over with you and take a look at my fire alarm? think it just needs a new battery but I can't reach it and don't feel good about climbing on a step stool." CONGREGATIONAL CARE

September 15 & 16, I attended a two-day Congregational Care seminar hosted at the Church of the Resurrection with a dozen other First United Methodist Church staff and lay members. It was a great opportunity to learn more about what it means to better care for people in our congregation, as well as anyone else we encounter in our daily lives. Why would all of these people spend about 12 hours out of their weekend to attend one of these trainings? Because we all have people in our lives who need care and we want to be the best version of caring Christian friends that we can be! The purpose of the seminar was to help churches create a care ministry that empowers the laity to work alongside pastors and staff to make sure the needs of congregants are being met. One of the main avenues for caring for people within the church is the Congregational Care Minister (CCM). These are lay people with a high level of commitment to caring for the congregation. CCMs visit people in the hospital, pray with those who are dying and their families, check in on people with ongoing health concerns, and visit with homebound members of the congregation, among other care tasks. While only a select group of people may want to have that level of commitment, there are still plenty of takeaways for those that may not become a CCM but interact with people who need physical, spiritual, or emotional care at home,

in church, or in the community.

One of the biggest takeaways was the importance of presence. Just being with someone who is going through a hard time or is lonely is a huge ministry in and of itself. Giving of your time speaks volumes. This impact is multiplied when we pray. Prayer helps to ground and center us, allowing us to be a conduit for Christ in our interactions. For a care visit on behalf of the church, people often expect prayer and when we offer up a prayer for them, we are inviting the Holy Spirit to be present in the room. If we are caring for people out in the community, our workplaces, or with someone who might be uncomfortable with prayer, we can always pray to God before our interaction or even during, asking God to be with us and guide us in the interaction to be able to care for the person as best we can.

There were many other topics that were helpful for caring for people including having boundaries, reading scriptures, and what to say and not say that I don't have enough space to elaborate on in this month's article, but we do have an awesome upcoming event where you can learn more! On Saturday, October 21 from 9-12, we will be hosting a short mini-seminar here at church where you can learn about how to better care for the people in your life who are struggling. Topics include: Helping Friends with Mental Health Challenges led by Kristen Howell, Caring for Someone at the End of Life led by Marsha Gaffin, The Art of Hospitality led by Kathi LaMoe, and Compassionate Care and the Bible led by Pastor Dave. We would love to have you join us to learn more about how we can better support people who are struggling and you'll be able to hear more about what we learned at our seminar. Often times the only time a church member talks to the pastor is to criticize something. Here are some statistics from the Soul Shepherding organization.

75% of pastors report being "extremely stressed" or "highly stressed"

90% work between 55 to 75 hours per week 90% feel fatigued and worn out every week 40% report a serious conflict with a parishioner at least once a month 65% feel their family is in a glass house

October is breast cancer awareness month, so you are going to start seeing pink. Schedule a mammogram, it could save your life. A regular mammogram, 22 years ago, discovered a cancerous lump in my breast. Since it was found early, stage one, no chemotherapy was needed. This even led to further events for me as nine months later stage four ovarian cancer

was discovered. Surgery and chemotherapy followed. A genetic test indicated I am positive for the BRCA1 mutation. People who inherit harmful variants in one of these genes have increased risks of several cancers-most notably breast and ovarian cancer. Speak to your health care provider to determine when you should begin regular mammograms. Early diagnosis is important. It could be life saving! YOU are important, and this is too.

Going Home

I left Kenya in 1994 to become a nanny in Germany. After finishing as a nanny, while I was studying at the University of Heidelberg when I met my husband, Michael. Since 1994, I have returned to Kenya in 1996, 2000, and 2007. I planned to return every five years, but life events got in the way; we helped my in-laws before they passed away, our daughter Jamie was born in 2009, and I studied for many years to become a nurse practitioner.

I returned to Kenya this summer after 15 years. It was a long overdue return to my roots. I traveled with my immediate family three American friends. For my friends, my daughter, and my nieces and nephew, this was the first time they were visiting Kenya and Africa. It was interesting to see how they all experienced this vacation.

We were in Africa for 3 1/2 weeks. We shared excellent world-class tourist experiences by going on Safari to the Masai Mara and having a beach vacation at an all-inclusive beautiful resort on the South Coast of Kenya, Diani Beach. We took the train from Nairobi to Mombasa. We took one day off our beach vacation to visit Mombasa.

Once outside the resort, we viewed the poverty in Kenya close up. There are rich, poor, and a small but growing middle class. We visited the historic Fort Jesus, built by the Portuguese, where they ran the slave trade until they were defeated by the Arabs who took over. After Fort Jesus, we walked through the old town of Mombasa, viewing and literally smelling the poverty. Our friends and the children saw another world as we walked through the alleys, seeing beggars and trash. We visited the Mombasa Market, purchased spices, and viewed the available fruits and vegetables. We visited the Bombolulu workshop, where the physically handicapped make crafts, including carvings, textiles, and wheelchairs. It was founded in 1969 by the Methodist Church. We could purchase gifts from the gift shop at a fair price without haggling.

While in Nairobi, we were honored to be hosted by KDF (Kenya Defense Forces) CGSC alums. They held a lovely luncheon for us and gave us many gifts to bring back. The next day, we had a family reunion at a cousin's house with a catered lunch for all our relatives. I saw cousins in their 30s and 40s who were small children when I left for Germany. Due to immigration, it was my first time with my mom and sisters in the same location. Jamie met over 100 relatives for the first time with her three American cousins and learned about Kenyan culture.

We also visited my former high school, a Catholic boarding school founded by an American Jesuit brother named John Koczka. It is five and a half hours from the capital in a rural area. I had not been back since graduating in 1992. My daughter, nephew, and nieces saw how different my school life was from theirs.

This trip was therapeutic for me and my family and made me realize that I am blessed beyond measure. Being back home, where everyone spoke Swahili was lovely, and 99 percent of the people looked like me. I am forever grateful for what the lord has done for me. Catherine Brettmann
