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

Think on these things...

Easter is scheduled for March 31 this year. The Lenten season is based on the lunar cycle, so the dates change when we have Easter. If you think that Easter is early in 2024, you are right. The earliest Easter could happen is March 22. For the fourth year, we're partnering with churches in the Kansas City area and 32+ global cities in ONEKC 2024. Our focus is a survey of the Gospel of Matthew that looks at Jesus as the Messiah. It's an exciting time to commit to attend worship each week during Lent.

February 14 – Ash Wednesday services at 7pm with community meal at 5:30 of soup and bread. Imposition of ashes is part of this service that focuses on repentance and confession of sin. Yes, it is Valentine's Day, too. You can come by the church from 8am to 11:45am if you cannot make it in the evening. Additionally, we have five weeks of community meals on Wednesday night and we will watch a word-for-word scripture telling of selected passages from Matthew. The videos are provided by LUMO Productions. They are available on outlets like YouTube also.

March 31 - Easter services will be at 8:30 and 11am.

One spiritual discipline that I want to encourage each of us to practice is to read or listen through all four Gospels during Lent. The reading/listening schedule will be available to the church and in this month's newsletter. Lenten is a season of spiritual growth and a fantastic opportunity to draw closer to God and others. LEAVENWORTH ATTAINABLE HOUSING

While serving at Community of Hope, Leavenworth's shelter and services for the homeless, Sister Vickie Perkins realized attainable/affordable housing was not available. The average rent in Leavenworth is \$958/month. A local survey shows more than 60% of renters pay over 50% of their income for housing, which

perpetuates the cycle of poverty and keeps people living in uncertainty and on the verge of homelessness.

Leavenworth Attainable Housing was created thanks to the brainstorming and creativity of 3 volunteers and the kindness of one man who donated his house in 2022. Less than two years later, thanks to several key churches and generous citizens, we now house 27 people in 11 rental houses...and counting!

The Attainable Housing Program

Involvement from the Leavenworth community is the key to success. Volunteers help clean and rehab the houses, creating a positive environment inside and beautifying neighborhoods in Leavenworth. Members of the community serve on the Advisory Council giving input and direction to the program, which includes the following four pillars:

Finance -residents meet with a financial advocate to develop a budget, set goals and move toward stability.

Health care - each resident seeks physical and mental health care from local providers as needed.

Community - residents come together once a month for a social event. Quarterly, residents meet together for support, conversation and problem solving.

House- provided with these regulations: participation in the 4 pillars ,weekly meeting with support specialist. Monthly rent is 1/3 of their income.

Upcoming in 2024

Thanks to a grant from the city of Leavenworth, we will build two duplexes, buy, and rehab four houses. We continue to raise money to rehab attainable houses, providing sustainable and strong community in Leavenworth.

A Blessing in our Community



The Richard Allen Cultural Center and Museum is a center that highlights African-American history, and so much more, here in Leavenworth. The museum is located at 412 Kiowa Street and is one of the most educational and interesting placing I have ever visited. The Cultural Center and Museum has been under the leadership of Edna Wagner, Executive Director, for the past thirteen years. Edna is a community pillar of education, investment and hope of our future.

Edna and her husband Dwayne first came to Leavenworth when Dwayne attended the Commanding General Staff College on Fort Leavenworth. The Wagner's' young sons attended Ben Day and Nettie Harnett Schools respectively. "We came to Leavenworth and lived on Pine Street by the river downtown. I walked the boys to school and then would pick them up. I got tired of going back and forth so I started volunteering to help in the classroom," stated Mrs. Wagner.


She then went on to be a substitute teacher at Anthony Elementary School where she was on the original team to bring Title I grant money to USD 453. "Title I money helps children who are struggling in their education. These were kids that needed a little extra help. They continued to grow the grant bigger so they could guarantee that these kids would get that extra help that they needed, according to Mrs. Wagner.

After years volunteering and teaching in the community Edna applied and was welcomed to her new position at The Richard Allen Cultural Center and Museum. What she is most proud of, is the impact the center has through education both for adults and tutoring for our children and the impact on our community. "I am most proud of how we have grown in the community with our kids and the community around us knowing what is available; what is here and what we have to offer."

"My prayer for us as we move forward is that we bring in someone who has the heart, the mindset to continue fertilizing the seed that was planted many years ago helping our kids in the community. We can't grow our community unless we grow the kids to have life goals and to see themselves having a future - when right now they might not see one. We have to educate them and help them see that there is a light. You know the term, there is a light at the end of the tunnel? There is always a light – but you have to make that light turn on – for yourself. That comes by setting goals, one at a time. Small goals. That way you are never overwhelmed but you know where you are going and where you want end up at", said Mrs. Wagner.

The Richard Allen Cultural Center and Museum opened in 1992 to highlight African-American history in Leavenworth, Kansas. In 1992, the museum opened in the former home of U.S. Army Captain William Bly, a Buffalo Soldier during World War I. The home is decorated to look as it would have in the early 1900s. In 2002, an addition was built to the front of the original home to display more items teaching about African-American history in Kansas. The center offers a glimpse into the history of African-Americans, both local and nationwide. It was created to ensure that the rich heritage of African-Americans and their profound effect on American society would not be lost. Their mission and purpose is to educate the public about the rich history of African- Americans and their contributions to every phase of American life. We promote a greater awareness of African-American heritage through research and cultural activities that enhance interracial understanding.

Educational programs are also offered through museum exhibits, tours, research opportunities and traveling exhibits for the general public. We also have a year-round tutoring program available for any student who needs the service. We have helped over 350 children improve their academic skills. The after school tutoring program serves K-12 students in the Greater Leavenworth Area. Tutoring is available from 4 to 5:30. The program is staffed by volunteer teachers, military personnel, and community members. Parents must enroll students on a first come, first serve waiting list. All students are welcome. LENT IS A FAMILY AFFAIR

The Passover is designed to teach children about the Jewish faith. A child asks a series of questions that are answered by the adults. Following their example, this year celebrating Lent will be a family affair with opportunities to share our faith with our children, our friends and our neighbors. Each week during Lent we will be joining with churches across Kansas City and the world in studying the book of Matthew with OneKC. Pastor Dave's sermons and the children's ministry lessons will focus on how Jesus was the promised Messiah or deliverer. There is a daily gospel reading plan and each week there are videos to bring the scripture to life.

Starting with **Ash Wednesday**, **Feb 14**, the sanctuary will be open from 8:00 am to 11:45 am for anyone who would like a private opportunity to receive their ashes and spend some time in prayer. We will have a soup and bread potluck at 5:30 pm with an Ash Wednesday service to follow at 7:00 pm.

Every Wednesday through Lent there will be church family potluck at 5:30 pm. During the potluck, there will be a "watch party" as we watch the weekly

Bible video and discuss our scripture reading from the week. There will be children's activities provided.

Our weekly meals will culminate with a catered meal on Maundy Thursday, March 28, that will include a special worship service and family Communion.

We will have a special Kids Event on March 29, called TGIGF

(Thank Goodness It's Good Friday) from 8:30 am to 3:30 pm. The day will be filled with crafts, games and other fun activities as the kids learn about Jesus' last week on earth. The day will include lunch and Easter egg hunt. Visitors are invited to join us. We'll join churches in the Leavenworth area for a Community Good Friday service on March 29 at 6:30 pm at the Lansing Middle School Auditorium.

Our Easter celebration on April 9 will be a grand traditional service for both the 8:30 and 11:00 worship.

OneKC is the basis of our Lenten season. This is a world-wide initiative to engage with the words of Jesus everyday for 40 Days—together. There are over 32 cities in different countries joining us. We invite you to download the app and invite a friend to join you. Check out OneKC.Bible to download the listening links from the YouVersion of the Bible. They are excerpts from the four gospels that only take ten minutes a day to hear. If you prefer to read from your own Bible, the scriptures are listed on the second page of the newsletter. There are weekly videos which bring the scriptures to life. You're encouraged to invited your friends and family to MARCH 29 watch the videos at your home or at our weekly potlucks. There are also online opportunities to share with your friends family live far away. We hope you will dedicate the 40 days of Lent to growing closer to God and to your church family.



Now that 2024 is in full swing, I want to continue introducing you to our GriefShare facilitators. This month's focus is on Suzanne Gray, one of our facilitators for the virtual class which meets at 5pm on Mondays. In addition to facilitating, Suzanne coordinates the electronic component of administering a virtual class via Zoom.

Suzanne, a native Kansan, was born in Hutchinson, attended Kansas State University and began her career in Topeka where she met her husband, Richard. Later she took a job with the Veterans Administration and in the early 2000s transferred to Leavenworth, where she started attending FUMC.

She immediately signed up to attend when we first began offering GriefShare. A series of deaths in her family

meant that she was responsible for clearing out three estates. In addition, she experienced kidney failure and received a kidney transplant at KU Medical Center. She realized that she was having a hard time dealing with so much loss on her own. "I was surprised that I got so much out of GriefShare, much more than I anticipated. You really need to attend at least three sessions before you decide to quit. The workbook and the video are so helpful. But what really helped the most was sharing and being with other people - that's where the healing begins".

After attending GS for about a year, Suzanne began to feel that God was calling her to do something, not sure what, but something to help others. Then, when Thaneshia Lindsey, a fellow member, expressed a desire to lead a GriefShare group, everything clicked into place. Suzanne had been clearly called to help with the new group.

Always attracted to psychology, one of Suzanne's degrees is in horticulture therapy, which enabled her to work at the Menninger Institute. Her first job at the VA was as a creative arts therapist working with PTSD patients. While living in Topeka, she also became a certified Stephens Minister where she made hospital visits and visited marginalized families.

Suzanne recently relocated to Florida. "Isn't it crazy and wonderful that God enabled me to take GriefShare along and do it virtually?" My answer to that is a resounding YES! God has made beauty from ashes and given Suzanne a powerful testimony.

The virtual GriefShare class meets every Monday through Zoom at 5pm. It is available anywhere in the United States. To receive a zoom link, contact Marsha at Marsha.gaffin@gmail.com. We also have a GriefShare group exclusively for spouses that meets on the third and fifth Tuesday of each month at 2 pm. We have also have a community GriefShare group that is open to anyone that meets on the second and fourth Wednesday of every month at 5:00 pm. Everyone will face grief in their life, but we don't have to experience it alone. GriefShare can help.


