As I write this article, I am sitting at my brother's bedside in Nashville. He's been in the hospital for around ten weeks now. Stepping on a nail precipitated a series of calamities, including three surgeries, two major health care mistakes, and a diagnosis so rare that only one in 10,000 people get it. He is being written up in medical journals, but that is no consolation to him. All he wants is to get well enough to go home. And who can blame him? Isn't that what we all want? To go home? My grief is palpable as I stand watch at his bedside.

As the facilitator for GriefShare, I have heard many stories and walked beside the participants as they took the journey we all dread. As a result, we are a close knit group, and I count each one a friend. Now, they are helping me. I have shared my uncertainties with them and asked them to share a sentence about what GriefShare has done for them. Here are some of their comments.

"What does Grief Share mean to me? Grief share is a safe place to sit in your grief and learn that you are not alone. Ups and downs are normal & new friendships are forged with people who understand what you are experiencing. Even after two years of being alone and thinking you have it all under control you can be triggered and you break down ... But your friends are there encouraging you. I love my grief share group." - Debbie

"GriefShare is a tool that God has given to guide individuals through the grieving process. However, I've applied the lessons learned to my daily life issues as well." - Thaneshia, GriefShare Facilitator

"My grief was so intense that I thought I was going crazy. GriefShare taught me that my feelings were valid and gave me coping skills. Moreover, I met people who encouraged me and helped me get through this journey." - Kerry

If you are in a season of grief, please don't try to go through it alone. We have three different groups. The spouse group meets on the third and fifth Tuesday of each month at 2 pm. We have an open community group for anyone experiencing grief that meets on the second and fourth Wednesday of each month at 5 pm and a virtual class that meets every Monday at 5 pm. Whether it is in one year or in ten years, each of us will die. If you were to go suddenly, would your family know your final wishes? Would they know how to access your financial accounts? How do you know what to plan and how to plan?

We are holding an end of life seminar on April 13 to help you begin to prepare. We'll have guest speakers who help families with these issues every day. We'll give information about medical directives, wills, funeral plans, and many other subjects. This seminar is open to anyone in our community so please invite friends and family.

A need that has come to our attention in the area of congregational care recently is the large number of people in our congregation who live alone. We view the Church as a form of family and want to make sure that everyone is cared for. If you live alone and would like to give us contact information for family and/or close friends that we can contact should something happen to you, we would love to be able to store that in our database. That way, even if you don't have any family nearby, we know who to contact in the event that something were to happen to you. If this is something you're interested in, there are Emergency Contact Information Forms in the front office for you to fill out. Come by during the week when we are open or feel free to ask Kristen, Libby, or Sandy for one. We are also the people you'll return your completed form to and we'll make sure it gets entered in!



March is the month we celebrate the risen Lord. Get on fire for the Lord – He is waiting. Financially, the giving in the first two months of 2024 has been strong and the church is in a great position to meet our fiduciary obligation for the year. Last year we exceeded, through your generosity, projected operational and ministry goals which will allow us to enact some needed physical upgrades, as well as continue our outreach to the local community.

Last month, we held our first church council meeting of 2024 and extended a welcome to Mike Brettmann the new Staff Parish Relations Committee Chair and Wyatt Brown the Young Adults Representative. Both hit the ground running with ideas and strategies that will enrich and strengthen our fellowship body.

Moving throughout the year, I encourage each of us to be in daily prayer – that we seek the heart of God and His divine direction over our relationship with Him, our family, and our church. I also encourage you to invite someone to church and church activities to walk with you in your journey with the Lord.

Prayer: The avenue we have to converse with the Father so we can receive co-laboring instruction on his will to impact all of mankind. Prayer is not just asking, but hearing and obeying our Father. We live down here on earth, but work through Him in heaven.

### **Loving Church Family Workshop**

On February 17, thirty six church family members gathered for the Loving Church Workshop. Pastor Dave started the program with explaining the need for congregational care. He explained how it is just not physically possible for a pastor of a larger church to meet all the church family's needs by himself. He said, "It's everyone's job to care for each other." That's why we are trying so hard to implement a comprehensive congregational care program.

Kathi LaMoe spoke about radical hospitality next. She told us that first impressions are formed in the first 30 seconds and most guests decide whether they will return for a second visit in the first 7 minutes. That is why she said, "Hospitality is everyone's responsibility, not just the clergy, or staff of volunteers." She gave us some practical tips to help visitors feel welcome here.

- \* Smile and make eye contact. If a person receives a smile from five different people, they will feel welcome.
- \* 3 minute rule Spend 3 minutes before and after each worship service to greet someone you don't know.
- \* 10 foot rule Be attentive to people within 10 feet of you. Make an effort to offer assistance to visitors such as telling them where the bathrooms or nursery are, explaining the attendance pads or picking up trash.

These three things can really let people feel loved and welcomed. Kathi said, "People will forget what you said, or did, but they will never forget how you made them feel."

Kristen Howell gave us an introduction to Mental Health resources in our community. She said, "About 1 in 5 adults experience a mental health condition in a given year and more than 1 in 5 adolescents. If you don't have a mental health disorder, statistics say that someone you love does. This is an extremely widespread issue and one that it is extremely helpful for each of us to have a basic understanding of - it could be the difference between life and death for someone." She gave out a helpful Mental Health Resource sheet. If you would like a copy of this sheet, please contact Sandy at the office.

Finally, Marsha Gaffin spoke to us about the importance of preparing for the end of your life, even if you are young. Her experiences with the passing of her good friend, Sally, helped her understand the importance of planning. It led to an End of Life Workshop that we will be hosting April 13. See more information on page 3. It was a very informative workshop. We will be planning new workshops with different topics in the future. We hope you will join us as we all learn better ways to love our neighbors and our church family.

February 15-24, Rhonda York and Claudia McAllaster joined a group from Global Hope on a mission trip to India. We started in Hyderabad, a technological center of about 10 million people, in roughly the geographical center of the country. Signs are in Hindi, English, and Telagu. There's construction everywhere. There are about 8 motorcycles to every truck, and they all drive as if traffic lanes and signs are only suggestions.

Part of our mission was to conduct Bible School sessions with the children in The John School. They can belt out "Father Abraham" with enthusiasm and they love to color. The school serves some children in their orphanage and some from the community. Their students score very high on the mandatory state assessment tests, and that buys them some tolerance from the local radical Hindu politicians. Nevertheless, Pastor John recently spent 3 days in house arrest because a state inspector found a Bible on one of the orphans' nightstands.

Another part of our mission was to witness to and encourage the staff. The John Foundation has a training academy for adults to learn job skills. They offer certification courses in fashion design and tailoring, pharmacy technician, beautician, electrician, nursing assistant, and computer software. Some of their graduates staff their commercial enterprises, including a garment factory and Bible importer, which helps support the school and orphanages.

On February 20, we moved to Palakol, a small town of about 60,000 in a poorer area near the East Indian coast. Again, we shared a program of music, art, and Bible teaching with the children from the orphanage and surrounding neighborhood. A worship service in the evening filled the alley with members of Pastor Zakkariah's church and neighbors. The biggest challenge was a meeting with about 20 local pastors. We were asked to share our faith testimony, something I had never done on a public stage before. What do you say to someone who doesn't have enough income, and lives in constant danger?

The most fun was taking the children from Palakol to the beach. Total strangers asked to take our pictures. We were treated like celebrities everywhere we went. Chefs even tried to cook "less spicy" food to accommodate our western palates. As I noted in a text message to my niece, the trip was amazing, terrifying, gratifying, and SO not home. - Claudia

















The Alliance Against Family Violence has a new logo and a new director, Katie Irvin, but they are continuing the same mission; to facilitating a positive change in the lives of those affected by domestic and sexual violence and to providing safe shelter in crisis. The four colors of the new logo represent an area that AAFV works with: purple represents domestic violence awareness, teal stands for sexual assault awareness, blue is for human trafficking and yellow represents stalking awareness.

You may think that Leavenworth county is small enough that it doesn't need an agency like AAFV, but in 2022 Leavenworth county had 631 reported cases of domestic violence, 31 reported rapes, and two reported cases of human trafficking. AAFV has a home with five bedrooms. They can house up to 20 people that are in crisis at a time. They also have advocates that work with survivors. They will go with them to the hospital or to court, help them gather documents such as birth certificates and driver's licenses, help them find a job and housing if necessary. Their goal is help survivors start a new life within 90 days. In 2023 they helped 66 unique families, but they had to turn away 61 other families because they just did not have space.

AAFV is funded in three ways: private donations, grants and government support. In 2023, Leavenworth county cut their support of all non-profits by almost half. In 2025, they will no longer provide any monetary support to non-profit agencies. This will leave a large budgetary hole for a lot of non-profits. Grants provide money for specific needs such as the house and groceries. Private donations pay for documentation that an individual needs replaced, building repairs and training. Donations also pay for medication for clients and their kids when insurance hasn't been established yet or insurance doesn't cover all of it. Private donations could also be used to provide a counselor to survivors. AAFV used to have a counselor, but it was paid for by a COVID grant and the money is no longer available. Private donations give AAFV the flexibility to help each individual be successful based on their needs.

Katie Irvin, the new director, said first goal for the future of AAFV was to create a better community presence. She is working with law enforcement, doctors, and colleges to distribute materials to people who may be in abusive relationships. The location of the AAFV shelter house is confidential so that abusers cannot locate survivors. But Katie would love to be able to have an office in the community so that people could drop off donations and her advocates could have a place to take care of business. She would also like to be able to rent a storage space so that AAFV could collect furniture and supplies for when survivors are ready to move into their new home. She would also like to start a program called "To Go Home" boxes. These boxes would contain basic items to start a new household such as dishes, silverware, towels, pans, cleaning supplies, etc.

Most of all, she would like to have enough resources to help all the people who come to AAFV for help.

"Grandma Gatewood's Walk" by Ben Montgomery is the next book the Book Club will be reading. Emma Gatewood told her family she was going on a walk and left her small Ohio hometown with a change of clothes and less than two hundred dollars. The next anybody heard from her, this genteel, farm-reared, sixty-seven-year-old great-grandmother had walked 800 miles along the 2,050-mile Appalachian Trail. By September 1955 she stood atop Maine's Mount Katahdin, sang "America, the Beautiful," and proclaimed, "I said I'll do it, and I've done it."


Driven by a painful marriage, Grandma Gatewood not only hiked the trail alone, she was the first person-man or woman-to walk it twice and three times. At age seventy-one, she hiked the 2,000-mile Oregon Trail. Gatewood became a hiking celebrity, and appeared on TV with Groucho Marx and Art Linkletter. The public attention she brought to the trail was unprecedented. Her vocal criticism of the lousy, difficult stretches led to bolstered maintenance, and very likely saved the trail from extinction.

Author Ben Montgomery interviewed surviving family members and hikers Gatewood met along the trail, unearthed historic newspaper and magazine articles, and was given full access to Gatewood's own diaries, trail journals, and correspondence. Grandma Gatewood's Walk shines a fresh light on one of America's most celebrated hikers.


# **Lansing High School Scholar Bowl Students Win Regionals**
