What is your motive or reason for your engagement in the church?

When did you start to follow Jesus?

How do you serve Christ in your occupation?

Why did you go on that mission trip or outreach ministry?

What is God teaching you right now?

Well, I hope you get the idea. Short stories of praise and gratitude for our journey so far. We want to record them for use in service. Some will be found in the newsletter. I believe ministry is always about the relationship, so hopefully we'll get to know each other better as well. I hope our lives fulfill the old Christmas song, "Go, tell it on the mountain, over the hills and everywhere." We have a story to tell of Jesus' love and his salvation for the world. That is done through proclamation and demonstration! Let's tell the story and tell it well at FUMC. Paston Dave

In December 2019, a group of volunteers met Elaine Belardo and heard about a need in our community and decided to do their best to help. They didn't have any special training or structured program. They simply wanted to bring a sparkle to the eyes



of someone living with dementia and to give their caregivers a moment of respite. AIR ministry was born.

The same group of volunteers has worked together for over 4 years bringing laughter, love and tasty snacks to our friends every Monday. Over the years we have helped 17 different families.

AIR ministry brought joy to each of our volunteers' lives. We loved working with our friends, but there are also moments of sorrow when one of our friends passed away or moved to full time nursing care.



After much prayer and consideration, it has been decided that it is the best interest of our friends and our community for AIR ministry to transition into the Deeper Window Association. Deeper Window is expanding to a third day of services with our volunteers and our friends leading the way. This will open up more opportunities for people living with dementia.

If you have lost a loved one, you may feel bewildered about how you should go on. The feelings associated with loss include extreme fatigue, sadness, loss of purpose, isolation and loneliness. Meet one of our congregation members, and learn how she has coped.

Our friend, Debbie Gebhardt, grew up in Alberta, Canada. After graduating from high school, her parents wanted her to attend a Bible college, so Debbie enrolled in Northwest Nazarene College in Nampa, Idaho. During her senior year, she met her future husband, Jim Gebhardt. Jim was just returning from Vietnam and was attending college under the GI Bill. Ten months later they married, and the rest, as they say, is history. Jim transferred to the University of Idaho in Moscow, enrolled in ROTC, and received a fellowship to the University of Washington. He became a Russian linguist and the Gebhardts enjoyed the Army life at various stateside Army posts and two tours in Germany, having two children along the way. Eventually, Jim retired, and they chose Leavenworth as their permanent residence. Jim then worked as an Army civilian.

In 2010, Jim was enroute to conduct business in Botswana and passed out in the airport. He went to the Embassy doctor who examined him and sent him straight home. Once stateside, he was admitted to KU Medical center and diagnosed with blood clots in his lungs and arterial hypertension. Eventually, in 2014, he was diagnosed with leukemia, and lost his struggle in 2021 at the age of 73.

"Even though he had been ill, he was a hard fighter", she said. "I had years to prepare, but when Jim decided to cease treatment, it hit me like a ton of bricks. My first feelings were numbness and being totally overwhelmed with decisions and paperwork. The kids had gone back to their homes and I was alone." Having to deal with so many unfamiliar situations was daunting."

Eventually, she decided to try GriefShare. "I needed to have somewhere to go, it was so lonely at home. It was nice to sit with others and talk about Jim and say whatever I wanted. I actually felt guilty because I had so much time to plan for the future, while some of the people lost their loved ones suddenly. Eventually I saw that neither way is easy. Over time, the painful feelings began to ease. It's still lonely, especially on weekends, but being with others who know what I'm feeling is huge. I've met some really nice people. It's okay to cry there, everyone understands and it's okay to be authentic."

Debbie said that she feels fortunate that our church offers GriefShare. She says that it has been a necessary part of her healing. "I've even started to feel like I can help others get through this".

The Spouse GriefShare meets on the third and fifth Tuesday at 2 pm. There is an open group that meets at 5 pm on the second and fourth Wednesday and a virtual GriefShare that meets at 5 pm every Monday. If you have any questions about GriefShare, contact Marsha at marshagaffin@gmail.com.

At 10:08 am, March 12, 2024, Methodist Hospital Stone Oak San Antonio, Texas, Ashley T., ward nurse entered Room 502 and said "your mother has coded, her heart has stopped, do you want us to resuscitate?" The next two minutes seemed to last for hours. My father, who just entered the room, was her medical proxy and made the decision to let mom go. She was 85 years-old, had a heart attack and a stroke two weeks prior, and had been in the hospital for two weeks – a week in the ICU and a week in a hospital room. My ma lived a beautiful and fruitful life, living all over the country and in Europe, having three thankful children, 11 wonderful grandchildren, and 23 adorable great-grandchildren all from a 67-year marriage to my dad. She impacted many more lives than just ours as she came

to the Lord at the tender age of 60, teaching us that it's never too late to find His love and forgiveness.

My parents had the foresight decades ago to have everything prepared in advance for my mother's passing. They have wills, medical directives, powers of attorney and a "how things are done" instruction notebook for the surviving spouse and family members. It included who to contact immediately, who handles what, and outlined when, where, and how to continue moving forward. My mother's wishes were that though she may be in her new room with our Father, day to day life for my father and the rest would not be financially nor spiritually devastating, though extremely emotionally painful.

Ed's mom gave a real gift to her family in an incredibly difficult time – the gift of peace of mind that they were honoring her wishes and the ability to focus on being with one another and grieving, rather than ironing out details. Tell Me Your Story...



Let me start by saying my first time in church was when I was three weeks old. My father gave up a potentially lucrative career to become a Methodist minister. He graduated from seminary when I was two years old. I was involved with my Dad's church every Sunday, sometimes attending 3-4 times on Sunday.

When I was about 9 years old, an evangelist, Tommy Harper came to our church for a revival. He was someone I can honestly say was "on-fire" for the Lord. My brother and I both went to the altar and were saved.

I married right out of High School and I guess I decided that being an "adult" and a wife was more important than being a Christian because I didn't attend church for many years. It wasn't until I remarried and my youngest was ready to go to school that I reconnected with the church and Jesus Christ.

One Sunday morning, I got a call from a family member who told me one of my cousins had died in an accident. She was a young mother with toddler triplets. That call was a shocking reminder that our lives are unpredictable, are not our own and I needed Jesus back in my life. I gathered my two kids and found a church that same day.

My job history is a little of everything I do here at the church. From database management, to banking and customer service, all my professional life fits some aspect of the job functions here. But working in a God-fearing, Jesus loving, prayer -filled environment means more to me than any 9-5 job ever could. Libby



Have you ever wondered why bad things happen? Have you ever gone through a time in your life when you no matter how hard you tried to serve God it seemed like everything was wrong? Five years ago, I was going through a very rough time. I had worked at the same church for 13 years. I had given it my all. There was a change in leadership and suddenly, nothing I did was right. I praved. I cried. I tried. I praved some more. For six months, everything I did was wrong. On April 20, my only daughter moved to Virginia. Easter was on April 21 that year. On April 23, I was fired. On April 25, my father in law was diagnosed with small cell cancer. It was a pretty rough week.

Where had God been those six months? I was truly trying to serve God, but my life was falling apart...

What I didn't know is that God was working on my behalf. He knew things I didn't know. He was preparing a future for me that I was oblivious to. As I look back on that time I see God's fingerprints and timing in everything that happened. Let me explain. Because I had been fired, I now was free to spend every day at the hospital with my in laws. They really needed me during that time. They were not used to driving in the city and I was able to dedicate all my time to them.

Two weeks after I was fired, Carla, my good friend, stopped by my house at 9:30 pm and asked me to apply for a job at First United Methodist. I was truly not sure I ever wanted to work for another church after the last six months. My husband and I prayed about it and we visited the church on Mother's Day. That was also Nancy Shade's going away breakfast. She had sensed God telling her to leave Children's ministry at this church at the very same time everything started going wrong for me at my church. After six months, she was leaving. I was eventually hired as the children's director to replace Nancy. VBS was my second week working here, but Nancy had set me up for success. She supported me the entire time I worked with children and has become one of my dearest friends.

God provided for me before I even realized I needed provision. I didn't know that the church where I had served would split within a year. I didn't know a pandemic was coming. I didn't know my husband would be disabled within a year. I didn't realize there were so many new and wonderful relationships waiting to be formed at a new church. But God knew. He had a plan. All the times I prayed He was listening. He was working. He was near, even when I didn't know it.

I am grateful that God made a place for me here at First United Methodist and I'm grateful to be a part of this family. Sandu

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April is Child Abuse Prevention Month. CASA is working to raise awareness about child abuse in our community. The CASA program in Leavenworth was established in 1994 and is based on the idea that average citizens can FIRST JUDICIAL DISTRICT ATCHISON AND LEAVENWORTH COME professionally trained volunteers who serve as the eyes and ears of the court. Even more importantly, these volunteers are a voice for the child. Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASAs) meet all involved parties and make an impartial recommendation to the Judge. These advocates appear in court for the child and represent the child's best interest. CASAs monitor a case until its end, helping bring swift and permanent conclusions. CASA Volunteers are everyday people, from all walks of life, who have been thoroughly screened and extensively trained to be a voice for the children they serve.

In 2023, 17 CASA volunteers served 39 children in our district. They served 1,857 volunteer hours. CASA also facilitated court monitored visits between children and their parents. They provided a safe environment for 111 children in 2023. The Child Advocacy Center provided forensic interviews for 120 children who were victims of crime in 2023. The Honorable Judge Wiley said, "Services CASA provides to the domestic court are necessary, generally invaluable and difficult if not impossible to replace."
