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

The Trustees, led by Mike Mix, walked through our historic facility last month and did a needs/wants inventory of the campus. Though hundreds of thousands of dollars have been spent over the last several years, as in all seasoned facilities, several areas of immediate concern and attention have been identified:

1. Drainpipe and gutter work around main building The gutters are rusted.

2. Drain pipes that run through ceiling

3. The age of the main church roof

Last month during a particularly violent thunderstorm we once again had water run from the southwest corner of Wesley Hall all the way to the basement. We are currently investigating the cause and potential correction to this issue.

4. Fire Detection and Alarm system in the main church (well on its way to completion)

5. Electric Circuits in Fellowship Hall

Through the first four months of the year giving has held strong, with the church family providing tens of thousands of dollars for ministries programs and thousands of volunteer hours. Generosity and compassion are the hallmarks of the use of our treasures. Potentially, we have several major expenses on the horizon, which we will faithful pray and plan for the resources needed to meet those challenges.

Two of his McArthur buddies, Barb Ernzen and Connie Harnish, decided that they should fix him up with a blind date. They tricked him by inviting him to dinner; on the way they told him they needed make a stop. They swung by St Joseph's Church, and out walked Michelle Lawrence; she had been practicing organ for the Sunday mass. "Why, what a surprise! Michelle, this is Kerry, Kerry, this is Michelle," then they promptly sped away, leaving Kerry and Michelle stranded. In spite of the awkwardness of the situation, they agreed to go to dinner together. They ended up closing the place down. When they returned home, they both knew that something special had happened. Kerry called his grandma and told her, "I've just met the girl I'm going to marry". Kerry and Michelle dated for three years and were inseparable. They married June 6, 1987. Michelle had a successful career at Ft Leavenworth and Kerry continued at McArthur, pursued his Masters, and along the way they had two sons. Kerry transferred to Lansing as an assistant principal. Life was good.

In 2006, Michelle had her yearly mammogram, which was normal. Six weeks later, she noticed a lump in her breast. Tests revealed metastatic breast cancer, so at the age of 44 she had a lumpectomy, brutal chemotherapy and radiation treatments. The treatments worked and she was pronounced cancer free. However, the KU medical staff warned that she must stay vigilant, as 35% of people with this variant had recurrence. She remained cancer free for the next 12 years.

In 2018, Michelle developed some small bumps on her shoulder. It seemed innocuous, but to be on the safe side she saw her doctor. The devastating diagnosis was Stage 4 cancer. It had metastasized to her bones, skin, and eventually her lungs and liver. More rounds of chemo ensued, and for a while she did well. Her body rejected the drug and started to fail. She lost her battle with cancer August 4, 2020.

Unless you've experienced it yourself, no one can imagine the desolation and trauma that comes with the death of a spouse. Kerry was utterly devastated, his whole world shattered. He couldn't return to his former life and eventually resigned his principal position at Lansing Middle School. His grief was intense and he slipped into depression. "I thought I was prepared, but nothing prepared me for the emotions I was experiencing. I even thought I was going crazy. I wasn't sure I could do this".

His friend Alicia Moody told him about GriefShare. At this point he was ready to try. "If someone had told me that swan diving off the Abernathy Bridge would help me with my grief, I would have done it". He started attending Grief-Share. The first thing he learned was that many people in the group had experienced the same emotions that he had, he wasn't crazy, he was deep in the throes of grief. He also discovered that he knew several of the people in the group, and felt comfortable enough to begin expressing his struggles.

"For me, as hard as the first year was, I believe the second year was even harder. By then, reality had set in and the visits and cards had tapered off. Thank God for my sons; they gave me a reason to keep going." He also wisely sought a therapist. Eventually, he started improving. "Every time I laughed, I'd feel guilty. GriefShare helped me process everything. I think if hadn't joined I would have become angry and bitter."

Now, almost four years into his journey, Kerry is a changing man. I'm so much more empathetic and I can put life's problems into perspective. He continued going to church. At first seeing someone else playing the organ was painful, and he also started taking on some of Michelle's tasks. He makes sure everyone gets a birthday cake, decorates for holidays and continues to follow through on plans that they had made.

He is going to Europe in a few days, bittersweet because they both had planned this trip together. He still has setbacks but continues to make progress. "You guys saw me at my absolute worst and you embraced my pain and cared. That was my first step towards recovery". He is also finding that he can help others experiencing fresh grief and assure them that there is hope.



infinite ways to think about God that still fit within the bounds of even a conservative orthodoxy. It was freeing, but ultimately having so much ripped out from under me at once meant I lost not only my faith, but also my worldview and, ultimately, myself. I felt like I was careening through space with nothing to ground me. I decided that I could never be okay with ignoring the very real questions and issues that I was raising, so I took a leap of faith and I let it all go. My beloved Christian Studies professor, Doc, encouraged me to keep pulling the thread that was unraveling, even if it was terrifying. I figured if God had given me a brain, God wanted me to use it. And that if God was worth following at all, God would be gracious to me as I explored and learned about what I believed and why. "God's grace is sufficient for me." became my mantra. I let it replace the ongoing repetition of the Sinner's Prayer that was constantly just under the surface. So I asked the big questions. I studied and learned and talked. I didn't guit seeking and talking to God, but I did ask God to go with me as I attended mini-lectures my college put on, inviting practitioners and experts of other religions to come speak about their beliefs. I wrote, and I read all the books, and I kept showing up. I discovered that even as the world felt like it was falling out from under my feet and God felt far away, God was faithful. I can see in hindsight all the places and ways God was working through that time. Through learning about other religions, I discovered that while there were things about each of them that I wanted to incorporate in my own faith practice (the Muslim commitment to prayer, for example, or the way that the Jews are much more playful with their interpretation of scripture), I was at home in Christianity. Something about the God that loves deeply enough to put on flesh and get messy speaks to my soul.


There's so much more to my story that wouldn't fit in the newsletter. My rough draft was 8 pages and that didn't even include everything. But the sum of it is this: God never left my side. I discovered that all this time I had been putting my faith in doctrine about God and not in the goodness and love at the very core of who God is. Once you believe that God is love, everything else is kind of ancillary. I went on to seminary where I thought my questions would for sure be answered and learned that a lot of times, we don't get the answers, and that's okay. I'm not done deconstructing and reconstructing -- I'm still reevaluating what I believe and why every day, but I hold a lot of it with an open hand. I hope I never stop adjusting my beliefs as I experience more and more of who God is. If I have the same beliefs at 82 as I do now, I probably didn't do a very good job of seeking to know God more. And one of the best outcomes is that I'm now able to work with teenagers and help them make their faith their own so that hopefully when they get to college they're so comfortable in their relationship with Jesus and know that it's okay to ask the big questions. Returning to my 90's roots, I'll leave you with this quote from Miss Frizzle that is surprisingly relevant: "Take chances, make mistakes, get messy!" Faith isn't about getting everything right, it's about encountering God along the way. *Kristen Howell*

Take chances. <sup>1</sup> Make mistakes. Get messy!



There's this stereotype of people who leave the faith that they were never "all-in" in the first place, but speaking for myself and many others who left the faith as we grew up, I can confirm that for many of us, it was the opposite. Like Icarus, the closer to the "Son" (pun-intended) we flew, the further we fell. From the very beginning, I was all-in, ride-ordie for Jesus. I grew up in a Christian home in the '90s and early 2000s, so I ended up in the very thick of Jesus-is-myboyfriend purity culture and "the end is nigh" doomsday sayers. We were in church every week, several times a week. I memorized scripture before I could read and said "The Sinner's Prayer" at age 4 to prevent my eternal damnation. I spent elementary school getting bullied for trying to convert my classmates at lunch because the pastor told us it was our responsibility to make sure those around us didn't go to hell. I got myself up at 6am on Wednesday mornings in middle and high school to attend the student-led interdenominational Bible Study. In summary, I was that kid.

As a kid, I was taught a particular brand of Christianity that pushes a scary, vengeful God who desires sacrifice significantly more than mercy. We knew that we were "saved," if we said the prayer, but the concern was that you might've said it wrong, so I began reciting it over and over, daily and then sometimes several times a day to cover my bases. I began to develop severe mental health issues. By the time I was a 5th grader, I was already suicidal and struggling with what I now know is OCD focused on religious scrupulosity. It turns out that years and years of being told I was damaged goods that disgusted God, paired with some really not great genetics in the mental health department is a bad combo.

At the time that I was having this damaging interaction with the Church, I was having a very different experience with God. While my earliest memories of church were rules, structure, and doctrine (not all bad things depending on context), my earliest memories with God are comfort, joy, and freedom. Because I was bullied so much as a child, I spent a lot of time talking to God. God as friend and playmate, was my first encounter with the Divine. God marveled with me at the stars at my grandparents' house and caught fireflies and danced in the rain, jumping extra hard in the biggest puddles. Every time I encountered something that reminded me how small I am and how big God is, I took in everything with awe and felt God's overwhelming love.

As I hit my teenage years, life drove a perceived wedge between me and God. I believed that God wouldn't want anything to do with a person like me. I couldn't pray my way out of depression and I was sexually abused by a boyfriend for almost 2 years and so all those purity pledges were out the window. The organized part of religion got bigger and bigger and my experiential knowledge of God's presence morphed more and more to fit inside the box of doctrine. God was still at my side, but I knew God less and knew about God more. Following Jesus became about being "right" more than about being in love.

Enter college: the culmination of several years of performative Christianity and obsessive rule-following meant that I was a big ball of anxiety and OCD, depression and self-loathing. I was the trifecta of physically, emotionally, and spiritually drained from years of needing to control my environment, my faith, and my God. I majored in journalism, but had plenty of space in my degree plan to take a minor so in response to my breakdown, I figured I would "think" my way out of what was guickly shaping up to be a doozy of a faith crisis by taking on a religious studies minor.

That decision ended up being one of the very best decisions I've ever made. It started simply. One small question here. Picking at a thread where something from my upbringing just didn't add up. I discovered that there were nearly


