

One of the lessons we learn from studying the Acts of the Apostles is that they were devoted to what we are calling "the core values" of the church: apostles' teachings, fellowship, prayers, worship and generosity/justice (Acts 2:42-47). The early church made sure to meet the needs of others inside and outside of their community. These practices were foundational to the growth of the church. God was doing amazing things through these disciples. "Everyone was filled with awe and many wonders and miraculous signs were being done by the apostles" (Acts 2:43).

I don't know if the works of FUMC would qualify as miracles, signs and wonders. I do believe we are making a difference in the lives of many people. We see the effects and hear the stories. God invites us into relationship and then invites us into the ministry of Jesus Christ. That causes our faith and action to rise up.



Let's keep our priorities clear: Without our relationship with God through Christ, the action of ministry would go nowhere (John 15:5). Meeting with other Christians for fellowship, meeting with God in prayer and worship, obedience to the teachings of Jesus are the roots that allow fruitful ministry to take place. NO ROOT MEANS NO FRUIT!

It's really both/and that we are seeking. Our hope is to love God with all of our heart, soul, mind, and strength, as well as love our neighbors as ourselves. Hard to do that latter without practicing the former. If we say we love God but hate our neighbors (or are apathetic about them), God says we are liars (1 John 4:20). I'm so thankful to pastor a church and live in a community where people want to make a difference in the lives of others. Let's never grow weary of doing good and seeking God in all circumstances!

We will be dedicating August 1, to 24 hours of prayer for our schools. We will be praying for the safety of our children and their teachers, wisdom for the school board and administrators and unity and respect in the classrooms. Education is a beautiful gift and our kids spend a great deal of their time at school. We pray that their time in school will be purposeful and productive. The church will be open from Aug. 1 at 6 am until Aug. 2 at 6 am for you to come and pray in a sacred space. We will have a sign up available with different time slots and a praise and prayer service in the evening.

Shift 2 and 3 duties could include monitoring the facility at the volunteer desk, be available if guests need anything, and cycling through laundry.

Join us as we host our monthly volunteer info and training session on July 10. I just returned from a wonderful vacation trip. The days were still cool up there, and the nights required a jacket - what a change from the heat and humidity of Leavenworth. Twenty-one members of my family joined Don and me to renew family ties as we hiked, fished, boated, ate s'mores, chased kids, ate some more and laughed together. It was a glorious time. Until it wasn't.

On the last day of our vacation, we were rocked to the core. It's not my story to share, so I can't elaborate. But suffice it to say that there was a tragic mishap, an unfortunate turn of events that resulted in a lost life. What had been a happy vacation event was forever changed into one of disbelief and horror. In a nanosecond, two families were forever altered.

So unnecessary. So pointless. So cruel. So traumatizing. God, where were you? Disbelief mingles with a desire for revenge, no amount of apologies make things better. Things like this just don't happen to us. Or do they? Why did this have to happen? I struggle to understand what good can possibly come out of this situation.

As I cry out to God in prayer, I'm led to recall his promises. My experiences need to be evaluated based on biblical truths. I can't interpret what happened based on how I felt, instead every event in my life must be understood by the scriptures, for the God revealed in scripture does not change. GOD DOES NOT CHANGE. Therefore the God who does not change can be relied on to keep his promises.

My limited insight sees shattered expectations that don't fit into my world view. Reality sets in as I realize that God is God and I'm not. God does not manipulate the universe to give me my way; instead, He comes to me, enters into my story and stands with me. He embraces my suffering in a way I could never imagine. God's love for me is immeasurable. You can always trust the Man who died for you. Love doesn't anesthetize the pain, it sustains me in the middle of the pain.

Will I ever understand why this happened? Maybe not. Probably not. God's ways are not my ways. His broader view permits what he hates to accomplish what he loves. For now, on this side of Heaven, I have to be content with that. Shalom, Marsha



Mixing It Up With The NOMADS

During an Angel visit several years ago, Jan met Gordon and Jane Wesner and during conversation mentioned that we had an RV. That struck a cord with them and they asked if we had ever heard of NOMADS (Nomads on a Mission of Divine Service). Jan had no idea what this group was all about. Gordon joked that it stands for Nice Old Methodists Avoiding Deep Snow. The group was formed in 1988 when retired Methodists were wintering in Texas and were bored, wondering what good they could do. They went to Methodist churches in the area and offered their services. Out of this effort, the NOMADS came into being and has been offering help with disaster relief and to churches and church camps that could not afford paid contractors. NOMADS are affiliated with the United Methodist Church, the Global Methodist Church, and the General Board of Global Ministries (UM).

Each year, hundreds of NOMADS, mostly retirees, live their faith by travelling in their RVs and performing service projects. From California to Maine and even in Mexico, NOMADS usually follow the sun as they fulfill projects across the America. The Wesners had been longtime members of this group. Gordon and Jane told Jan stories about their mission trips and encouraged Jan to consider joining. She couldn't wait to get home and tell me about this opportunity.

We discussed the possibility of joining and procrastinated over actually taking the next step. We have lived a life of travel and service in all countries we lived in. We volunteered in Poland and Romania with Habitat for Humanity, visited orphanages in Turkey, visited cancer wards for children in Romania, raised funds for equipment for hospitals and childrens homes and even had opportunities to help clean up a Methodist church and private homes in Beaumont, TX after Hurricane Harvey (this while waiting for the arrival of a grandchild.)

We have enjoyed our trips to Camp Horizon (a Methodist Church camp) in Arkansas City, KS led by Gary and Cheryl Rader, performing a vast array of jobs including: secretarial work, tree trimming, deck replacement, painting, power washing, even painting lines on a court for basketball and for pickle ball. Sounds fun doesn't it?

This spring we finally took the plunge and joined NOMADS. Our first three-week project was up in Fremont, Nebraska at Camp Fontenelle, a Methodist youth camp. There were 5 of us and we worked on replacing the deck boards on a massive deck that wrapped around the dining hall.

We began each workday with devotions at 8, a prayer time and a song, with breaks in the morning and afternoon along with a lunch hour. The work week is from Monday-Thursday 8AM to 4PM. The three day weekend is intended to provide us rest and an opportunity to visit family or points of interest in the area. There were only five of us and we got the job done and even headed home a day early.

Currently NOMADS offer about 175 projects each year and has over 800 members. A list of projects and locations is published on the Nomad website and you are free to signup (pick and choose) wherever you would like to serve.

Why do we do this? We love to serve. We have skills and experience to contribute. We enjoy travel and meeting other people and even better, a life of service has no age restrictions. We especially love Church camps because we

were both attendees and counselors at Camp Chippewa in our youth and know that many young lives will be impacted by encountering Christ in a camp setting, often for the first time.

We feel called to serve. We feel blessed to serve. We love meeting other Christians who make up our work team and the people that reached out to NOMADS for help. If you would like more information about NOMADS ask Jan or Mike Mix or check out their website methodistnomads.org.

- 2) Do Good some evidence I saw at Annual Conference:
 - **A)** There were 2 days of reports from the agencies, committees, and work areas of the Great Plains Conference about all of the ministries and the good they are involved in all over Kansas and Nebraska.
 - **B)** We approved a plan to (re)district the Great Plains Conference so that missions and ministries are grouped more efficiently in 10 districts, each supported by a District Superintendent (DS). The names of the new districts will reflect where they are located. For example, our church will be in the Northeast Kansas District.
 - **C)** We took up an offering and passed a resolution to help aid the Santee Sioux Nation (located in Northeastern Nebraska) with obtaining clean water. They have been under a no-drink order for 5 years and have had to rely on bottled water for all their freshwater needs.
- 3) Stay in Love with God some evidence I saw at Annual Conference:
 - **A)** The Annual Conference meeting is full of worship, joy, laughter, and fellowship. Every day begins with a worship service. And anytime you have a gathering of ministers, there's going to be a sermon, or 2, or 3.... Some of my favorite quotations were "When no one is there to cheer us on, that's when the road is the hardest." Bishop David Wilson; "The opposite of faith isn't doubt, but certainty." Lisa Maupin, Conference Lay Leader; "Change that we don't want, or like, can be beautiful and ...holy." Rev. Stephanie Ahlschwede; and "Listen Carefully, Speak Boldly, Act Swiftly" Great Plains Youth Worship.
 - **B)** We passed a resolution to reaffirm the UMC's core beliefs in the sovereignty of Jesus Christ and his saving grace and in the holiness of scriptures.
 - **C)** There were plenty of opportunities for fellowship and to sit with your 1000+ best friends! In small groups we explored why we were United Methodists.
 - **D)** If there's a gathering of Methodists, there's going to be music and singing boldly with good courage. There's just something holy about singing "O For a Thousand Tongues to Sing" with over a thousand tongues singing! We also bunny-hopped to "The Lord of the Dance."
 - **E)** And lastly, there was joy as evidenced by laughter and humor and Scott Brewer's commercial breaks for "Hoaxberry; your denominational publisher of all things immaterial" (a word play on Cokesbury, the publishing house). Hoaxberry is the creator of the Boomers hymnal (all your favorite hymns set to familiar rock hits from the 60's and 70's), the Book of Discipline for Kids (illustrated), and The Lord's Supper in a Box (all you need for communion a wafer, some Welchs' grape juice, and hand sanitizer. For our gluten-free friends, the box top doubles as 12 gluten-free wafers).

Annual Conference

LAY LEADER REPORT

As your lay leader and delegate to the Great Plains Annual Conference, I got to attend that conference on June 6-9, 2024, in Kearney, Nebraska. First, some background information. The United Methodist Church (UMC) is a connectional church, meaning that all UMC churches are connected in an organizational system that seeks to unify and strengthen the church and its ministries.

Think of the United Methodist organization being structured like homes, cities, counties, states, regions, and countries. Our Leavenworth 1st UMC is our home which is located in the Kansas City District, which is part of the Great Plains Conference, which in turn is part of the South Central Jurisdictional Conference of the United States and which is then part of the General Conference (the whole global UMC).

Back to the meeting I attended. The Great Plains Annual Conference (GPAC) is the business meeting of all the local UMC churches in Kansas and Nebraska. The conference attendees include clergy and laity (non-clergy) from those local churches, as well as clergy and laity from the district levels and the conference level. I know that I may have already lost some of you at the mention of business meeting but hang with me. The Annual Conference is actually a joyful gathering in which business also happens to happen.

Next some history information: John Wesley is the founder of Methodism and the UMC is based in his theology. There are 3 Simple Rules distilled from John Wesley's teachings;

- 1) Do No Harm,
- 2) Do Good, and
- 3) Stay in Love with God.

So, to stay true to John Wesley, here is my report about the Great Plains Annual Conference.

- 1) Do No Harm some evidence I saw at Annual Conference
 - **A)** The GPAC heard a report from its delegates who attended the General Conference (the meeting of representatives from the whole global UMC) in April/May 2024. The delegate team reported about changes that occurred at that meeting. Changes included:
 - 1) revising of the Social Principles of the UMC to make them more succinct, more theologically grounded, and more globally relevant;
 - **2)** changing church law by removing restrictive language regarding homosexuality, LGBTQ clergy, and bans against same-sex weddings while allowing for churches and pastors to make local and individual choices to agree to participate or not without penalties for either decision;
 - **3)** recommending Regionalization, an amendment to the UMC's constitution to restructure the denomination by adding Regions (the US and each of the central conferences in Africa, Europe, and the Philippines) so that each Region would be able to adapt the Book of Discipline (the UMC's policy book) for specific missional effectiveness;
 - **4)** expanding Deacons' and Associate Pastors' roles to now include being able to serve communion and conduct baptisms in their ministry settings.
- **B)** The Great Plains Conference was well represented at the General Conference with several delegates in key leadership roles. The Great Plains Conference's Bishop David Wilson (the first Native American Bishop in the global UMC!) presided over a session and provided a sermon at the General Conference (the global UMC meeting). The Great Plains Conference also provided the largest number of interpreters to that global meeting. The Great Plains delegates followed the Do No Harm rule by leading with compassion and vision.
- **C)** To do no harm, the GPAC approved a 3% increase in clergy compensation to honor our excellent clergy while being cognizant of individual churches' declining resources.
- **D)** We passed a resolution to review all the names of our Great Plains United Methodist entities to ensure an understanding of the history and purpose of the names, and relevance of the names today.
