



Refuge York

Summer has flown by so fast and we can't believe we're already preparing for the school year ahead! As we near the 2024-2025 school year, we wanted to give you an overview of what the youth group does through the year. We would love to have students going into 7-12th grades join us!

Refuge Youth Group: Youth group meets Sunday nights from 6-7:45 in the youth room (basement of the education building) during the school year. We kick off each year with a lock-in at the church and then the youth group runs from midway through August through the end of April. We generally don't meet in May because the end of the school year is bonkers for everyone. This year, our lock-in is August 9-10. The general format of our youth group is time to eat dinner while catching up, games, and then a lesson. We take a few Sundays off a year for holidays (mostly around Christmas and Easter), but otherwise, we meet every week.

Youth Sunday school: Sunday mornings, we meet from 9:45-10:45 for youth Sunday school in the youth room. Sunday school goes year-round. Starting this fall, we are welcoming 5th and 6th graders to youth Sunday school, as well.

Fun Outings: We typically try to schedule three fun outings during the school year (Fall, Winter, and Spring) and one per month over the summer when we aren't meeting weekly for youth groups. We do different things and have done escape rooms, scavenger hunts, arcades, kayaking, museums, etc.

Trips: We typically take two trips per year - one in the summer and one in the week between Christmas and New Years. The summer trip is always focused on service projects and the winter trip is typically just for fun (though we do sometimes partner with service organizations during those trips, as well). Generally, those trips have been within driving distance (10 hours or less) from church, though last year, we took the high schoolers overseas.

Other Service Opportunities: We also take on service opportunities as they arise throughout the year. Sometimes this means we work on a service project during youth group. Sometimes, it means we're helping an elderly congregant with moving or household maintenance or doing something out in the community. It just kind of depends on what opportunities pop up.

The center offers a glimpse into the history of African -Americans, both local and nationwide. It was created to ensure that the rich heritage of African- Americans and their profound effect on American society would not be lost. Their mission and purpose is to educate the public about the rich history of African- Americans and their contributions to every phase of American life. Educational programs are also offered through museum exhibits, tours, research opportunities, and traveling exhibits for the general public. 






Sept. 3, 1 pm



What I Did On My Summer Vacation



Alexis Hoffman has had a very busy summer. In June she traveled to Colorado Springs to join 47 Army youth from 30 garrisons worldwide to participate in the 2024 Army Teen Panel and Youth Leadership Forum. Alexis was one of the leaders because this is her second year to attend. She arrived early with 12 other leaders to prepare things for the other kids. While they do have fun, this Forum also does some important work. They address problems that military kids face. The leadership team Alexis was on received 27 different problems to consider. They narrowed the list down to 8 categories. Then all of the kids voted on the top three problems to work on. After that they worked in committees to brainstorm ideas to fix these problems. At the end of the Forum, Alexis and her team debriefed Col. John S. Chu, Executive Officer to the Commanding General, U.S. Army Installation Management Command. Here is their report.

1. Life Skills

Some military kids have both parents that can deploy at the same time and military life can demand a lot from parents. Because of this, sometimes military parents don't have as much time to teach important life skills. The military has two programs called Smart Girls and Passport to Manhood that teach kids life skills like cooking, changing a tire and balancing a checkbook, but the are very gender biased. The Leadership Forum would like equal training from these programs because everyone needs to know simple cooking skills, how to sew on a button and how to manage money.

2. Healthy Intimate Boundaries

The military has the SHARP program that addresses sexual harassment, but it is only available to military personnel. The Forum wanted a similar program to be developed for teenagers because there were many students who felt they had been sexually harassed.

3. College Preparation

Because military students move from place to place with their families, many of the students did not feel adequately prepared for college. They also asked for assistance in applying for college and financial aid.

Alexis said, "I was really nervous to brief Colonel Chu. I felt relieved that I had presented but also proud because we are going to be making changes for the future. All the ideas aren't going to happen right away, but we are hoping we helped make a difference."

When she returned from the Forum, Alexis headed to Camp Chippewa where she was part of the junior staff. This is a new program that allows students to work in all the different areas of camp. Alexis helped set up games, lead worship, build campfires, and lead trail rides. She also worked in the mess hall and helped keep the campers safe around the animals. She had 13 younger campers in her cabin. She said, "I learned a lot of patience working with younger kids." Gaga ball is a favorite activity at camp. Everyone gets muddy, even the counselors!

When asked about her favorite part of being a junior staff member, she said, "I like how much energy the kids have and how they love to worship God and how they pay attention to the stories." Sounds like a summer well spent!

My dad was fairly young, 78 years old, when he died from colon cancer. My mom was 74 years old, the same age I am now. My parents had been pillars in their church; between the two of them they had probably served in every position and done every menial task there was to do in their church. When Dad died, Mom took great comfort from the hundreds of cards and letters she received. But one day, inevitably, the cards stopped.

Around six months later, the church received new pastors, a husband-wife team of ordained ministers. After a couple months of getting settled into their new position, the female pastor called my mother. "Marge", she said, "I've heard so many things about Frank. I'd like to pick you up and take a picnic to the cemetery, and you tell me all about him." And that's what they did. They went to the grave site, spread a blanket, ate their lunch, and Mom talked and talked about my dad.

The reason I'm sharing this story is because of the profound impact it had on my mother, and vicariously on me. It was as if, once he died, my dad was all but forgotten. Friends never brought him up in conversation, he was the "elephant the room", the verboten subject. What was it about my dad that, once he died, made people uncomfortable to talk about him? The fact is - my mother desperately needed to talk about him. It was an integral part of her grieving process.

My take-away from this story is simple. When you are with someone who is grieving the loss of a loved one, encourage them to talk to you about them. They will love you for it. I had the opportunity to actually recreate the picnic scenario many years later. I was at my friend Sally's side when her son Curtis died. Months later, I picked her up, drove to the cemetery, spread a blanket, and served a picnic lunch. Sally talked and talked and talked about Curtis. It still brings tears to my eyes to remember how much this simple act meant to her.

If you know someone who is grieving, please tell them about our Grief Share program. All of our Grief Share groups are open to the community. Talking about your grief can really help with healing. We have a special group for spouses who are grieving that meets on the third and fifth Tuesday of each month from 2-4 pm. We have an open group for people grieving all kinds of losses that meets on the second and fourth Wednesday of the month at 5 pm. We also have a virtual group that meets through Zoom every Monday at 5 pm. VBS By The Numbers

What a great week we just had here at the church! Kingdom Quest VBS was full of energy, kindness, and of course God and Jesus. VBS by the numbers this year:

- 59 Kids registered (5 were unable to come due to illness or travel)
- 27 Volunteers during the week
- 50 Kids on our highest day of attendance

But these numbers are just the beginning of the story... When divided up into categories: 12 of the kids come to FUMCL regularly, 15 of the kids have some kind of family connection to FUMCL or have been to a previous VBS which leaves 20 kids that we did not have contact with before VBS! Many are new to Ft. Leavenworth; some are long-time Leavenworth residents.

That's really awesome! But these numbers just tell one small part of the story of VBS. We were also able to help provide support for our community and our world through our mission projects for the week. Our monetary donations go to World Vision to send Bibles to countries around the world in their native language. Because of the generosity of the kids and of our amazing congregation, we raised \$145.32 Enough to send 29 Bibles.

During the week we collected items for our mission partners. We received 25 boxes of cereal/oatmeal, 8 packages of dry pasta, and 37 jars of pasta sauce; as well as 183 pairs of underpants and 196 pairs of socks!

There were LOTS of seeds planted for God's Kingdom. We're confident that God will continue to work in the lives of both the participants and all the leaders and helpers.

Each day we "unlocked" another Key to the Kingdom using a story from one of the Biblical kings as an example. During the closing on Friday, you could have heard a pin drop as we interviewed Jesus. I wish you could have seen the kids faces when they came up to hug Jesus and tell him thank you.

Our supply list for donations and items to borrow were filled out by so many different people. You have yet again, exceeded my expectations in your ability to find cardboard boxes! 

What you may not know about the Guidance Center is that the Chief Operating Officer and Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinic Director is a part of our church family! Maggie Myers and her mother, Marcia have been attending here since Marcia moved here from Ulysses, Kansas.

Maggie began her professional career as a youth minister. She served in Winfield and then in Augusta, Kansas for four years. During that time, Maggie started going to a therapist. Her therapist asked her, "What do you want to do?" Maggie said, "I want to do what you do." So Maggie decided to get her Masters in Social Work from KU. Her church was very supportive. They let her go to school part time while she was still was a youth pastor.

Maggie started her social work career in Ulysses, Kansas. She worked at their Community Mental Health Center for 12 years as a counselor and case manager. That mental health center had to serve 13 counties in western Kansas. Clients often had to drive many miles for services. She later moved to Topeka to become

a trainer for an insurance company. She also worked with a case management team and helped people coordinate services. This taught her a lot about resources available around the state of Kansas. In November of 2021, Maggie moved to the Guidance Center in Leavenworth. Originally she was a grant writer. She was recently promoted to Chief Operating Officer.

Maggie is passionate about mental health. She said, "Mental health is <u>health</u>. That motivates what I do in working with the Guidance Center to continue to offer as many services as we can."

Be Kind to Your Mind

According to the National Institutes of Health (NIH), 57.8 million adults, or 19% of the population, have a mental illness, but only 43% receive treatment. According to a study done by USA Today, based on people who self reported mental illness, Kansas was number four in the nation with 26% of the population needing mental health care. Kansas was number 23 in the nation for people who do not receive the mental health care they need. In Kansas, 52% of the people polled did not get help with their mental health issues. Mental health is often stigmatized, so people try to hide their need for care. But caring for your mental health is just as important as caring for your physical health.

If you or someone you know are struggling with anxiety, depression, PTSD or other mental health issues, you many be wondering if there is any help available in our area. The Guidance Center, located at 500 Limit Street in Leavenworth, is a community based, non-profit agency that serves as the local Community Mental Health Center for Atchison, Jefferson and Leavenworth Counties in Kansas. We provide a full range of quality outpatient and inpatient referral/release services for individuals, families and businesses in our communities. They offer a broad array of home and community based behavioral health services, always prioritizing those who are most in need without regard for their ability to pay for care. The Guidance Center is the only provider of psychiatry services in the three-county area offering a sliding fee scale for individuals who have no other way to pay for their care.

The Guidance Center not only offers individual, marriage and family counseling, they have six school based clinicians that go into the public schools to work with students. The Guidance Center has also developed the Assertive Community Treatment team (ACT). This eight member team consists of nurse practitioners, employment specialists, and therapist that focuses on adults with significant mental health struggles in our community. They work off site in the community, for example they have regular visits at the Interfaith Community of Hope. They also have a counselor who is available to go with police officers on calls that may need mental health assistance. They also have a Justice Involved Behavioral Health Liaison who works with the jail, the courts and law enforcement. The Guidance Center also has emergency service available 24 hours 7 days a week.

One of the newest resources the Guidance Center is offering is Guiding Lights at 711 Marshall Street which is the former Cushing Hospital. Guiding Light's goals are to serve as a resource to individuals and families preventing unnecessary hospitalization of persons who can benefit from community-based resources. Areas of service include: Sobering Services: withdrawal management with average stays of four to six hours. Allows client to become sober enough to make treatment decisions regarding drug/alcohol treatment.

Crisis Observation: a supervised unit for stays of up to 23 hours. Observation room is a large room with a circle of recliners. Clients are not assigned a bed.

Crisis Stabilization: Length of stay determined by crisis symptoms. Crisis services and medication evaluation, as needed. Clients will continue to be assessed until determined symptoms are stable and the client is able to discharge to a lower level of care. They will have a case manager and support staff working with them.

The Guidance Center has offices in Atchison and Oskaloosa. They also host the monthly Leavenworth County Mental Health Advisory Council which includes law enforcement, public schools, Community of Hope, Leavenworth Attainable Housing, St. Mary University and concerned citizens all working together on our community's mental health.


