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

On my recent vacation, I saw one of the great landmarks in the United States. I took a one-hour harbor cruise to see the Golden Gate Bridge in San Francisco. Built in the 1930's in only four years, it is a marvel to see and learn about. Did you know the naval department wanted to paint it yellow and black (picture a bumblebee) so that airplanes and ships could see it at a distance?

One of the urban myths that was dispelled was how it is painted. While the myth was busted, the concept around it holds truth for discipleship. I heard that the Golden Gate Bridge is painted year around. Painters get to one end and then have to turn around and start over again. That is not true. The myth is an example of how things continually need to be done. Painting the Golden Gate Bridge is not a one and done deal. While it is not painted all the time, it is constantly maintained and repaired. To leave a valued treasure in disrepair would be tragic and lead to all kinds of problems.

Our prayer life is like this, too. It is an ongoing discipleship practice. We need to continually be in the practice of prayer. The method of doing it is not so much the important thing, but our relationship with God, that is the key. Our relationship with God is constantly calling us to reorient our lives to what God wants from us. That takes communication. We adjust to what God invites and commands us to be and do. Our prayer lives are not one and done.

As we grow in our discipleship with Christ, we are becoming who God calls us to be. Prayer is the intentional focus on our love for God. This fall, we are focused on prayer which I hope will be affirming for things you already know and do. It is a learning opportunity to change and adjust your life. Nothing is too small or too large for us to take it to the Lord in prayer. Yes, pray for rain for your garden and world peace.

Keep on praying for a circumstance or friend. Confess your sin before God and accept the grace and mercy of knowing God wants to forgive the contrite heart. Say thank you as a form of worship and adoration. I invite you to come along with us on this journey of learning to pray. You'll be glad you did!

We catered a buffet dinner and decorated the room with a valentine theme. Each lady was given a rose and a box of chocolates. Libby provided a craft and they all took home their own flower painting. They had a chance to introduce themselves to the group and make new friends, to have a fun social time where nobody felt like a fifth wheel. It was a huge success. They now meet every other month and show no signs of slowing down. But, why take my word for it? Here are some words from actual attendees:

"It's a great Friday evening out meeting people who understand what you are or have experienced. What fun to sit and enjoy a meal with new people and make friends and to share the good, the bad and the ugly And of course so much laughter!!" Debbie G.




Bible Study








We have Sunday School classes for all ages that meet in the Education building from 9:45 - 10:45 am. You are welcome to visit any of these classes.

Everyone has doubts. Where is God when bad things happen? Does God hear our prayers? Is there a heaven? How can we know? Often we treat such questions as the enemy of faith. But uncertainty doesn't mean our belief is lacking. Doubt can be a path to a deeper, richer encounter with God. In Wrestling with Doubt, Finding Faith, author and pastor Adam Hamilton discusses our most significant sources of doubt and shows how a steady trust in God can emerge from them. Questions like: Does God exist? How can I know? Is the Bible true? Why are prayers unanswered?

Hamilton approaches these sources of doubt with honesty and insight, drawing on the rich wisdom of the Bible, Christian tradition, and his experience walking with thousands of people on their spiritual journey. Whether you're a longtime Christian or someone brand new to faith, this book will lead you to a trust in God that is unafraid of hard guestions. Wrestle with doubt and find faith—belief and trust, not certainty; mystery rather than simple answers.

KOINONIA SUNDAY SCHOOL **ROOM 103**

The Koinonia Sunday School class is currently doing a study of 2 Kings and 2 Chronicles. Raun Watson teaches this deep dive into the scriptures. Second Kings is the history of the divided kingdom of Israel, picking up the story around 853 BC. In 722 BC, the powerful nation of Assyria invaded the northern kingdom, scattering and taking captive the people of Israel. Only Judah remained intact. But then Assyria suffered a stunning fall to the Babylonians. In 586 BC Babylon destroyed Jerusalem and took additional prisoners into captivity. Many people who were considered valuable to the invaders, such as the prophet Daniel were taken to Babylon. By the 2 Kings & 2 Chronicles end of Kings, the people of God no longer inhabited their Promised Land. The people had been enslaved, scattered, and decimated by their enemies. The class meets in room 103. If you would like more information, contact Raun at cavemanrg@earthlink.net.

The Family Matters class meets in room 107 of the Education building. They have been studying Francis Chan's Forgotten God: Reversing Our Tragic Neglect of the Holy Spirit. As Jesus ascended into heaven, He promised to send the Holy Spirit—the helper—so that we could be true and living witnesses for Christ. Chan contends we have neglected the Spirit for far too long. He exposes the enormous gap between what scripture says about the Spirit and how most believers and churches operate today. Through solid scriptural support and compelling narrative, Chan reveals the Holy Spirit as the Bible describes him. No Chance Of Survival



Pastor Dave will be preaching a series on prayer in September. Kristi Edington knows the power of prayer because she has seen it work in her life. This is her story.

I grew up in a Baptist home and we were active in church activities and learned the power of prayer at the age of 14. My brother was in a tragic accident at our home and my sister and I stayed up all night and prayed for him. We knew it was a miracle that he had been blown up by dynamite and survived!

I knew Jan 15, 2003 would change my life, I just had no idea how it was going to happen. I was having gastric bypass surgery and couldn't wait to begin the weight loss journey ahead. However, upon awakening from surgery, I knew something was very wrong. I felt like breathing was so difficult. By the fifth day post-op, I ended up coding the first time. That left me in an induced coma on life support for nearly three months. During that time, I had nine more surgeries. My surgeon had neglected to reattach the intestine. I was full of infection and my abdomen had to be left completely open to heal from inside out. During this time, the pastor would come in and write a prayer on the white board for family and staff. Every visit, a new prayer. The doctors were skeptical that I would survive at that time. I was in multi-system failure and had so many complications. I did pull through with the power of all the prayers that were said and continued.

In 2012, I had gone with Heart & Soul to a women's ministry event. I had been through surgery after surgery, infection after infection. At that time, I had a PICC IV line in my arm for antibiotics. I wanted to go down front for prayers at the end, however, didn't think I could make it back up to the group. Nancy Shade gathered all of us together and they encircled me and prayed for me to be protected in prayer and feel His healing grace, I was in tears by the end of the prayer. After fifty two surgeries & procedures over the previous nine years, I felt so worn and weak and didn't know how much more I could take. The next morning I woke up feeling a gentle peacefulness to my soul. Two days later, I ended up hospitalized with a clotted and infected IV line. Through more tests, it was discovered that I had clots all over in my chest veins and upper arms. I was forming clots as fast as they were busting them up. The surgeon came in and told me that he could do the surgery I needed but he was not skilled enough to do it and keep me alive. I was transferred by medical jet to Mayo Hospital in Rochester, Minnesota.

After three weeks there and another surgery, I headed home. We stopped at a roadside bathroom for a break. As Rodney, my husband, helped me with my walker, I tripped on the uneven sidewalk concrete, just going down to my hands and knees. Rodney guickly picked me up and I finished my business and we headed on home. I felt lucky to have only gotten a scraped knee out of it. The next morning, my home health nurse arrived to assess my dressings. When I lifted my nightshirt, my side was completely black from bruising. I was bleeding internally from that little fall!

After being at KU for a few days, the doctor came in and talked to me and my family. He said, "I'm sorry, but we won't be able to save you. Your body is clotting all over due to extensive bleeding and the bleeding continues. We can't stop the bleeding because of all the clots you are getting and we can't treat the clots because of all the bleeding. You have no chance of survival." My mom and husband were crying but I was not. The doctor asked," Do you understand me? You are going to die. No matter what we do, we can't save you." I just smiled, "That's okay. I see this as a win-win situation. If I live, I win. If I die, I believe in Christ and know that my home is in Heaven, so I win that way. Sure, I'd rather live, but I'm good either way."

Through all of this, since the Heart & Soul trip, I had felt a special protection, almost like I was being held by Jesus. When things were really bad, the pain was unbearable, I still felt comforted in my soul. I could actually "feel" the prayers people prayed for me. I knew that I was being held by Our Lord. It is a difficult feeling to describe because there are no words that even come close to describing it. This feeling stayed with me through my recovery, until one morning I awoke to feeling empty. It was gone. I had recovered enough that it wasn't needed any longer. But, oh, how I long for that feeling again!

Through this all, I had fifty four surgeries and procedures over ten years and coded five times. I actually died completely only the first time. I've been asked if I ever say Jesus or God. My reply is always the same, "No, I didn't. I believe that is because I didn't need to see Jesus to believe, I already believed and He knew that and was with me



through the worst of times." When the initial surgery occurred, Patti, my youngest was only seven. By the time I had my last surgery for this, she had just graduated from high school. Many times, I doubted my own strength to get through those times. It wasn't easy. The prayers of all those who believed I would be healed are what sustained me when medical science couldn't. Never discount the power of even a simple little prayer.




