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

Think on these things...

But you, O Bethlehem of Ephrathah, who are one of the little clans of Judah, from you shall come forth for me one who is to rule in Israel, whose origin is from of old, from ancient days.

Micah 5:2

With the echoes of Christmas songs fading from my ears, I keep going back to *O Little Town of Bethlehem*. It was the home of King David. I also think of *Once in Royal David's City* and Joseph was from this family line. The prophecy of Micah 5:1-2 was that this small town would be the birthplace of the coming Messiah. In 2 Samuel 7:11-13 told us of the covenant that God made with David that one of his family would be on the throne eternally. For being an unimportant place, Bethlehem plays a critical role in the story of salvation.

I wanted to take us back to Bethlehem, not for the Christmas manger scene, but for the origin story of Ruth and Boaz. This gem of a short story tells of the ancestors of King David, his great grandparents. They were people of extraordinary character and faith even though the circumstances of their marriage and family were unusual. Ruth and her mother-in-law, Naomi, were two widows left destitute by tragedy and sorrow.

Bethlehem was home for Naomi until famine pushed her family away. During this story, we see how Boaz, a man of standing, responded to them with grace and generosity. Ruth showed her virtue of being loyal, courageous, and industrious. All along, God is with them as the story of redemption unfolded.

As your pastor, my commitment is to preach and lead through scripture. This story fits well into a post-Advent period and has the power of teach us about God's providence and how each one of us responds to adversity and opportunity. I am looking forward to it. This sermon series will run January 19 through February 23. Along with worship services, I'll be leading a small group on Tuesday night from January 14 – February 18 on the book of Ruth. It's a great opportunity to go deeper in study and discuss how to apply what we are learning to our lives. We have books in the office for \$15 if you are interested.

Divine Resilience: Covenant of Faith is an evocative stage play set in the 1800s. It tells the story of the Oblate Sisters of Providence, who came to Leavenworth, Kansas, to run an orphanage for African American children. The Guardian Angel Home in Leavenworth, KS, was one of the oldest OSP missions. Victoria Messonier, Gertrude Smallwood and Dominica Thomas - were among the first Sisters to establish the orphanage for African American boys. The orphanage was later expanded to include girls. They also opened a school for the children.

This play was written by Lolita Law, a local author, who discovered the history in the Saint Mary archives. The play explores themes of faith, resilience, racial tensions, and community, with performances set to coincide with the birthday of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. This production is more than a play; it's a journey through history, faith, and resilience. This story will inspire and uplift audiences. It will be at Xavier Hall on the St. Mary's campus. Tickets are available at the Richard Allen Cultural Center for \$25 for adults and \$15 for students.

In the study, you are encouraged to slow down and linger with the living Word. You'll appreciate the pace of the Savior who never hurried but completed all that the Father called Him to accomplish. In John's Gospel, you'll be challenged to become a learner—understanding that the peace Jesus offers is not an ease of circumstances, but a stillness of the soul. Pastor Dave will be leading a Bible Study on the book of Ruth by Sandra Richter. Set in the midst of one of the most corrupt eras of Israelite history, Ruth is a story about three compelling characters. Naomi is an elderly widow who has lost everything and returns to her homeland empty and bitter hoping simply to survive. Ruth is Naomi's young daughter-inlaw, also a widow, and a foreigner, who at great personal cost, refuses to let Naomi face the future alone. Boaz is the local patriarch—a man of wealth and influence who in this epic tale is given the opportunity to do the right thing, even though the right thing might not be the obvious thing. In The Epic of Eden: Ruth, Dr. Sandra Richter makes each of these characters come alive. Participants in this study—young and old, men and women, churched and unchurched—will be challenged as they see themselves in these characters and find themselves faced with many of the same questions and challenges. Here is real life, lived out by real people with real fears, real struggles, real hope, and real faith.







Looking for a light, fun book to cuddle up with this January? The book club is reading Pony Confidential, a new book by Christina Lynch. In this one-of-a-kind mystery with heart and humor, a hilariously grumpy pony must save the only human he's ever loved after discovering she stands accused of a murder he knows she didn't commit.

Pony has been passed from owner to owner for longer than he can remember. Fed up, he busts out and goes on a cross-country mission to reunite with Penny, the little girl whom he was separated from and hasn't seen in years. Penny, now an adult, is living an ordinary life when she gets a knock on her door and finds herself in handcuffs, accused of murder and whisked back to the place she grew up. Her only comfort when the past comes back to haunt her is the memory of her precious, rebellious pony.


Hearing of Penny's fate, Pony knows that Penny is no murderer. So, as smart and devious as he is cute, the pony must use his hard-won knowledge of human weakness and cruelty to try to clear Penny's name and find the real killer. This acutely observant, feel -good mystery reveals the humanity of animals and beastliness of humans in a rollicking escapade of epic proportions.

Similarly, Paul's letter to Titus, a young pastor in Crete, is filled with personal affirmation, counsel, and guidance on how to prepare church leaders for effective evangelism. These letters of instruction are as inspirational for us today as they were for these first-century Christ followers.






The Koinonia Sunday School class enjoys digging deep into the Old Testament one verse at a time. If you join this class you will receive a Bible Atlas with Charts and Biblical Reconstructions that help you gain historical insights in the context of Biblical times. The name "Koinonia" is a Greek word that means "having in common partnership and fellowship" through a participation and study in God's Word. Ezra's narrative reveals two main issues faced by the returning exiles: the struggle to restore the temple and the need for spiritual reformation. Both were necessary in order for the people to renew their fellowship with the Lord.


