



Love is a word that displays the English language's lack of precision and nuance. What kind of love do we mean? What type of love is being displayed in our story of Ruth? It's not patriotism which is a love for country. Nor is it brotherly love "philo" to the Greeks. We get root words from this type of love like philosophy - love of wisdom or Philadelphia -City of Brotherly Love. With Valentine's Day coming up soon, we know that romantic love - that between lovers or married people - is seen and heard in songs, poems, flowers, and public displays of affection. Different kinds of love but not what we see in Ruth's story.

The Hebrew word, hesed, is what we experience in Ruth's story. It takes many English words to encompass its meaning - kindness, mercy, strength, faithfulness, steadfastness, grace, love. Hesed is all of this rolled into one concept! It's a concept that is deep and powerful. Hesed is covenant lovalty that is one of the most positive attributes of God. It is love that goes beyond dutiful requirement. God's steadfast loving kindness is seen in the actions of Ruth toward her mother-in -law, Naomi. Naomi saw her life as a dead end – no hope for the future. She urged both of her daughters-in-law to go back to their homes and start a new life without her. But Ruth said, "Do not urge me to leave you or to return from following you. For where you go, I will go, and where you lodge, I will lodge. Your people shall be my people, and your God my God. Where you die, I will die, and there will I be buried. May the Lord do so to me and more also if anything but death parts me from you." (Ruth 1:16-17).

Hesed was embodied by Ruth when she was clinging to Naomi – abiding love that remains no matter what the situation. No circumstance can make me leave you, even if it means taking the more challenging path in my own journey. That's the kind of love God has for you. Covenant loyalty – we like the word "grace" in the Methodist tradition. It tells us NO MATTER WHAT. I WILL STAY BY YOU AND LOVE YOU FAITHFULLY.

Commitment to another at the deepest level of our being. Jesus instructed disciples of all ages "Abide in me as I abide in you" John 15:4. Just as Ruth stuck with Naomi through the hardship and triumphs of their lives, Christ has made the same promise to us. His challenge for us: "As the Father has loved me, so have I loved you. Abide in my love. If you keep my commandments, you will abide in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and abide in his love. (John 15:9-10).

I covered our recent youth staycation in the last edition of the church newsletter, but because it's Black History Month, I wanted to take the opportunity to focus on the first day's activities in the 18th and Vine District. If America committed to sharing the history of all Americans, we wouldn't necessarily need a Black History Month. But because history isn't written from the margins, we must allocate time, space, and resources to tell the stories of history that are unlikely to get much focus without intentionality.

That is why it is so cool that we live in a place where there are little alcoves of history from the margins within our very community. We spent the morning of Day 1 serving at City Union Mission downtown sorting coats and other donations. After that, we went to Arthur Bryant's BBQ and had lunch from the very restaurant started by "The Father of Kansas City Barbecue." As anyone who's talked to a KC native for more than 5 seconds knows, we have the best barbecue in the world (a few other communities will argue otherwise, but they're clearly wrong), and it all started in the hub of Black businesses at 18th and Vine.

We followed this delicious excursion with a trip to The Kansas City Jazz and Negro League Museums which are housed in the same building. If barbecue is Kansas City's edible claim to fame, Jazz is our greatest artistic export and the 18th and Vine District was the heart of jazz in Kansas City. Despite Prohibition being in full-force during the 1920s and early 1930s, jazz clubs and dance halls hosted jazz musicians and bands from dusk to dawn where a very distinctive type of Kansas City sound started to develop. Nationally-known musicians like Count Basie and Charlie "Yardbird" Parker not only got their starts in Kansas City, but heavily influenced the trajectory of jazz music here and throughout the country. I had never been to the Jazz Museum before, despite living my entire life in the metro, but I was surprised that so much of the museum is audio-based. The museum features all sorts of different speakers with recordings of jazz musicians of up to a century ago and allows you to hear how music evolved over time right in our own backyard. Because it is so audio-based, I would not recommend the museum for people who are largely visual learners, but for everyone else, and especially those who enjoy music, it is a fabulous stop.

Our next stop was the Negro League Baseball Museum which tells the story not only of Kansas City's Negro League team. The Monarchs, but also the story of Negro League Baseball as a whole during a time when teams weren't allowed to be integrated in the Major League Baseball. The museum is full of triumphs and setbacks and filled to the brim with cool pieces like jerseys, balls, bats, and other memorabilia. In the center of the museum is an infield with life-size statues of real players. It was a lot of fun to watch little kids running the bases to burn energy. It was a favorite of our youth because of how visual the whole museum was.

Finally, we followed that with a small trek to the African American Archives of Kansas City, which, as you might guess, was filled with Kansas City's own African American history and art. It's a smaller museum, but free and definitely worth the short walk from the other two museums. It featured pictures and information you're unlikely to get anywhere else because of how specifically localized the history is. It was really cool to see the ways that the events happening in Kansas City mirrored and interacted with the events happening on a national scale. All in all, I highly recommend this outing to anybody looking to learn more about history in our own backyard. Kristen Howell

UMCOR DISASTER RELIEF UPDATE

United Methodist Committee on Relief

UMCOR is the mission organization of The United Methodist Church. Global Ministries works in 115 countries. partnering with local churches and organizations to amplify the impact of its projects and programs around the world. Through its networks, programming, and missionary personnel, Global Ministries reaches thousands of people every year.

Shortly after Hurricane Helene inundated communities in North Carolina with nearly three feet of rain in just a few days in September, Spruce Pine United Methodist Church became a hub for disaster relief. It wasn't their plan, but God needed a way to send help to this community, and this congregation provided that way. Though the church had neither electricity nor water, it was spared severe water damage, and on the third day after the storm, church members and their pastor, Rev. Holly Cobb McKim, assessed their own situation and turned to help others.

For weeks following Hurricane Helene, every square foot of Spruce Pine UMC was in service to the community. They offered a food pantry, water, a clothing closet, and baby supplies. The Western North Carolina Disaster Response office asked if the church would be willing to host Early Response Teams (ERTs) already making plans to travel to the region to serve. Within days, the United Methodist Committee on Relief sent the conference a grant to help with relief efforts.

The church set up dormitories in children's ministry rooms and constructed a temporary shower facility outside for what turned out to be literally hundreds of UMCOR-trained ERTs coming from conferences across the country. They visited for a week at a time to serve the people who had seen tremendous devastation, loss of property and natural habitat and worst of all, loss of family members. Pastor McKim noted: "I've been United Methodist all my life. How many times have we taken up special offerings for UMCOR? And we've sent money, and this is the first time it's been right here in my own backyard! That's actually a very humbling experience. Learning how to receive everything that everyone has given us has been extremely humbling and gives me hope in humanity.

On Jan. 7, strong winds in Los Angeles caused wildfires to spread rapidly in multiple communities. Thousands of homes and businesses were destroyed, as well as many United Methodist Churches. Preliminary assessments of the damage is underway. UMCOR has awarded two solidarity grants to the California-Pacific Annual Conference to undergird their immediate relief efforts. This includes evacuee support like food and essential supplies as well as support for volunteer efforts and other relief activities. 

No uncomfortable triggers here, just a three day weekend ahead. But wait—OH NOOOO! Not Valentines Day! This seemingly inconsequential holiday is loaded with triggers, from the heart shaped candy boxes to the profusion of roses. And don't get me started on the cards (be my valentine!), lingerie, Hallmark movies and restaurant specials. - Send a sweet letter to a grandparent.
- Tell someone how proud you are of them, and why.
- Give praise to a colleague.
- Take someone to lunch.
- Let someone in traffic merge into your lane.
- Visit a friend who is in a nursing home.
- Send someone a care package.
