In 2024, Brendale was a caretaker for her husband, Doug, who lived with Alzheimer's. He experienced sundowners and so he became especially agitated and restless after 4 pm. These times were difficult for Brendale because she could not let him out of her sight and she had to continually distract him from negative behavior. One evening after a stressful day Brendale finally got Doug settled in bed but she knew she could not sleep vet because Doug often got up and wandered. So she began to write. She poured out her desire to create a positive place for Doug and also to remind herself to stay positive. Once she started writing, she continued for months. Whenever she had a few free moments from caring for Doug, she would write.

Brendale drew upon her experience working at Xavier Preschool here in Leavenworth. She loved working with the children. She loved watching the children and how easily they made friends. She said, "A child might get angry with another child if they take their toy, but they forgive easily."

She remembered one little boy that cursed at the other children when he was mad. The other kids avoided him because he scared them. She sat down and talked to him about why he cursed. He told her that his father always seemed angry and he would curse at him. So she asked the boy, "What makes your father happy?". He said fishing, so Brendale and the little boy would draw pictures of fish for his father to make the situation more positive. It was situations like this that inspired Brendale to publish all the things she had been writing while caring for Doug because she wanted to help other children know that they were important and that they can take action to make difficult situations more positive.

Brendale did some research and found a publishing company that would create illustrations, help her edit the book and then publish it. They went through several revisions of the book and then Doug's care took the forefront of Brendale's attention and she kind of forgot about the book for a while. Doug passed away in December 2024 so she had more time to focus on the book again.

Brendale said, "I started thinking about me and Doug. We were a mixed couple black and white - and in a way I think we were like a rainbow." One of the lines from her book says, "We are like a rainbow of colors wonderfully made. We are a bridge built on love, faith, hope and strength that endure the challenges of life. Learn from all the things that come out of a situation. There will be good times as well as bad times but the lesson learned is timing. Take time and understand everything in the moments that takes your breath away."





When she loses her parents in an accident, sixteen-year-old Rosanne is taken in by the owners of the vineyard where she has lived her whole life as the vinedresser's daughter. She moves into Celine and Truman Calvert's spacious house with a secret,

however—Rosie sees colors when she hears sound. She promised her mother she'd never reveal her little-understood ability to anyone, but the weight of her isolation and grief prove too much for

her. Driven by her loneliness she not only breaks the vow to her mother, but, in a desperate moment, lets down her guard and ends up pregnant. Banished, Rosanne believes she is bound for a home for unwed mothers. But she soon finds out she is not going to a home of any kind, but to a place that seeks to forcibly take her baby – and the chance for any future babies - from her.



In February 2024, Rhonda York and Dr. Claudia McAllaster went on a Global Hope mission trip to India. While they were there, they met many of the children that live at the Kathryn E Larsen Children's Center (KEL). Rhonda met Mavulla and decided to "adopt" her by providing \$100 a month to Global Hope to help with her education and living expenses.

KEL is located in a small town in the state of Andhra Pradesh, which runs along the southeastern coast of India. The Children's Center, which is run by Pastor Zakkariah and his family, is in the middle of a very poor community where children are at high risk of abandonment due to a family's inability to provide basic essential care to their children. Since 2012, Global Hope has partnered with KEL to accomplish multiple purposes. It is home to 26 children who are poverty orphans. These children have become one large extended family. There is a large dining hall where not only these children have their meals, but also where other very poor children in the community can come to have a meal twice a day and receive clothing and basic care necessities. Finally, KEL has room for the children and families from the community to gather together regularly. The 26 children cared for at KEL are both girls and boys, aged 6 to 19 years old. They all attend school with dreams about being doctors, teachers, police officers, and engineers. Global Hope wants each one to have an opportunity to realize those dreams and break through the cycle of poverty!

Rhonda recently received an update about how Mavullu is doing. Mavullu is a healthy and happy young lady. She always has a smile and good word for everyone she meets. She is doing well in school, her favorite subjects are math and Hindi. She works hard in all her classes, is earning good grades, and has regular attendance. She enjoys singing songs and playing games with her friends. Mavullu had a wonderful Christmas and New Year filled with joy and laughter, she was happy to celebrate with all the other children at KEL. The photo above is from their Palm Sunday celebration

Pastor Zakkariah said, "She won first place in the college in a writing competition. She is first in all subjects. She recently participated in a running race in school." She also has developed an interest in learning how to use a sewing machine and has been practicing in her free time.



NE NATION UNDER GOD... I attended First United Methodist Church beginning in 1970 when my father, Jack Walker, was transferred by the

Army to Ft. Leavenworth. We moved here from Baltimore, Maryland, where we lived for the previous six years. During those years, we attended Bethesda United Methodist and some of my most precious memories were attending Exeter United Methodist with my paternal grandparents. They lived in the city and we walked to the church. Family and church were always part of my life.

My mom, Doris, delved into genealogy after my brothers, Jack and Kevin, and I graduated from college, affording her more time to pursue her personal interests. Back in those days, research involved traveling to genealogical libraries, courthouses and writing letters requesting information. I can vividly remember calling Mom and her anticipation as she waited for the mail to arrive with an expected reply to a query.

One day my husband, Ollie, and I went to visit Mom and Dad, and Mom asked me to sign the application papers for the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR), a women's service organization rooted in service to God, home and country. I didn't know anything about the DAR, but I dutifully signed the papers. Even though I lived in Shawnee at the time, I drove to Leavenworth to attend meetings with her. One thing led to another, and 37 years later I find myself as a senior leader in the national organization.

The past three years, I have been traveling the globe to promote the DAR America 250! Committee for the National Society. As a widow, I appreciate the opportunity to be actively engaged. I have met countless members through my long-term membership and have been afforded many courtesies. One of those courtesies was an invitation last year to visit New Jersey and attend the dedication of a DAR marker which was being placed by a local New Jersey chapter in celebration of our nation's Semiguincentennial. Accepting the invitation, I left for New Jersey knowing that the first of my eight proven Revolutionary War patriot ancestors was from Perth Amboy, a neighboring town to the one that was obtaining the marker.

A longtime DAR acquaintance picked me up from the airport and took me to explore New Jersey, including the Ford Mansion in Morristown which was used as George Washington's headquarters for several months. I discovered that I am related to Jacob Ford, the father of the owners, Jacob Jr. and his wife Theodosia. The senior Jacob served as a judge in Morris County and as representative from Morris County to the New Jersey Assembly. The Ford family and related surnames of Arnold and Phillips are interred at the Burying Ground of the Presbyterian Church in Morristown. The church was founded in 1738. As I walked through the tall grass, I was equally alert to the prospect of finding a snake as I was the headstones of my ancestors!

I found my Wolley family line buried in the Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church graveyard at Oldwick, formerly New Germantown, which was founded in 1714. Some of my Martin line was buried at the First Baptist Church of Piscataway, which was founded in 1689. The trip also led me to Perth Amboy and the graveyard where James Martin, my first documented Revolutionary War ancestor on my maternal side, was buried. I was afforded the privilege of looking at and holding early church records. In an account from the church, I read "The early history of the St. Peter's Church is principally to be found in the records of the Society for Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts instituted in England in the year 1701."

Being the lead of the Congregational Care Team has its rewards and challenges. I've made so many good friends but, also have had to do my share of learning about grief, illness, and even death. So it was with my friend and buddy Jerry Scheele.

I first met Jerry when he started attending our caretaker support group for people with dementia and Alzheimer's. It didn't take me long to understand that he and I were kindred spirits. Over the course of the next two years, I began to learn a little about his life.

Jerry joined FUMC in 1961. His parents, devout Catholics, had wanted him to become a priest, but God had other plans for him. After meeting Marge, he knew she was the love of his life. Marge was a member of FUMC and they married in our church in April of 1962. His parents refused to attend the ceremony. I suspect they came around when those grand babies came along, and they grew to love Marge as well.

One of the activities Jerry told me about was being a part of the church camper club. Many weekends were spent at Perry lake, rain or shine. The kids got muddy, the wood ticks feasted on them, the pop-up camper got soaking wet - but everyone had a ball. Some of the camper families besides Jerry and Marge were Dale and Bernie Roller, Miriam and Don Cade, Arlena and Ira Butler, Carl and Linda Ayers, Roger and Nancy Burrows, Stan and Paula Frederick, and Leah and Bill Johnson.

A graphic artist by trade, Jerry did a lot of artwork for the church. When the church was remodeled under Jake Defrees's direction, Jerry drew up a lot of the prototypes. The church added the two front wings, redesigned the sanctuary to face north, and totally remodeled the kitchen. Jerry also designed the souvenir plate commemorating the centennial. He made the front outdoor sign. When kids from the junior high school next door would deface it, he purchased bulletproof plexiglass to cover it. The vandalism stopped.

Somewhere along the way, Don and I started delivering Samaritan's Buffet meals to his house. At first I was met with resistance, but he was soon converted. He never failed to call and compliment the food and express his thanks. He even fabricated a special insulated box for the front porch so that I had a place to leave the meal if he wasn't home yet from visiting Marge at Twin Oaks.

Jerry was loyalty personified. He NEVER deviated from his devotion to Marge and faithfully visited her every day. This is what eventually led to his final illness. On a particularly icy and cold morning this past winter, Jerry slipped on the ice, falling heavily against the rear view mirror of the truck parked next to him at Twin Oaks. The fall broke several ribs which led to an infection, which led to pneumonia. Over the course of the next six weeks his strength began to fail him. Yet, up until the last week, he still called me just to check in and see how things were going. He always ended the conversation by saying, "God's in charge."

I have no doubt that my friend is busy in Heaven, drawing up house plans for Marge's arrival. I'll see you again, my friend. Yes, God's in charge Marsha Gaffin
