How many of you are simply weary? Physically, the body is tired, not sleeping well, if at all. Or no matter how much sleep I get, I wake up worn. What if the body is doing ok but you are soul-tired? The stress and pressure of the world and all of its circumstances weigh on you. Anxiety creeps up, which causes emotional and physical fatigue. Days or even seasons like this remind us that we are NOT the Energizer Bunny. We need to stop and take breaks. Rest is a gift that God gives us and helps us remember that we have limits of strength, stamina, and endurance.

In 1 Kings 18:16-40, after Elijah had vanquished the prophets of Baal in Israel's holy cage match of deities, he was worn out. That often happens to people after hitting a spiritual peak. Additionally, he prayed fervently for God to send rain so that a long drought would end (1 Kings 18:41-46). If that wasn't enough, Queen Jezebel put a hit out on him to take his life (1 Kings 19:1-2). It was so bad for Elijah that he wanted his life to end so he wouldn't have to face it anymore. Whoever said prophets of the Lord had it easy? Elijah cried out to God in lamenting prayer.

While you may not be a public enemy like Elijah was, the results are the same. We are afraid, tired, and drained. First thing he did was sleep (19:5). The Lord had compassion on Elijah and sent an angel to physically feed him with bread and water (19:6). The angel told him, "The journey is too much for you" (19:7). Elijah would still have to make the journey to Mt. Horeb that the Lord called him to take. But the angel allowed him to have spiritual and physical rest. He gained stamina for the remainder of his journey through prayer, rest and what we would call self-care. Restorative time for soul repair helps us find endurance and perseverance to finish the work God calls us to do.

Ecclesiastes 3:1 says, "For everything there is a season, a time for every activity under heaven." We can't spend all of our days resting and relaxing because the Lord has work for us. Nor can we exhaust ourselves on the journey. As we begin the autumn season, we can't go on to do God's work without some soul care!

I'll be starting an Bible Study Sept. 23. It meets on Tuesdays at 6:30 pm in Wesley Hall. In choosing what to study this fall, I wanted a topic that was designed for people who may be struggling or going through a season of perseverance and endurance. I also wanted a short term study that could be done before holidays started. This study on Elijah fits especially well.

One feature of this Bible study I really like is options for study. There's a basic study that has five daily readings, an average 20 minutes per lesson. A second option is deeper study. In addition to basic, a weekly reading plan will take you through the books of 1 Kings and 2 Kings, a history of Israel from the end of King David's reign to the Fall of Jerusalem. It allows for full



from the end of King David's reign to the Fall of Jerusalem. It allows for fuller context for what was happening before and after Elijah's time. A lighter commitment option is do what you can, show up on Tuesday and enjoy the lesson.

Workbook and Bible are needed. Workbook is *Elijah: Spiritual Stamina in Every Season* by Melissa Spoelstra. We have 5 new copies in the office for sale. Books and e-books are also available on Amazon.

Don and I are typical of about a third of the members of our congregation. We're Baby Boomers, which means we have lived long enough to be retired from our paying jobs, still able to enjoy travel, socializing, and enriching activities. but young enough that we aren't beset by debilitating health problems or financial constraints. Our children are fast approaching middle age, and our Gen-Z grandchildren are young adults. I suspect, if you are reading this article, that you also fall into one of these categories.

Being still of sound mind, at least in my own biased opinion, I recognize that these idyllic days may be coming to their natural conclusion, i.e. old age could overtake us at any moment. There will come a day that, instead of making my own decisions, my daughters will feel compelled to make them for me. I will be "forced" into a smaller home, maybe even The Home, the dreaded nursing facility. None of us knows what awaits. But, in the interim, while I still possess my faculties, I am trying to be intentional about what is to become of "my stuff".

Here's the deal - if you don't believe me, ask Google - our kids don't want our stuff. That China cabinet that Don and I saved up for three years to buy means nothing to them. They certainly don't want the blender that I took to the basement just in case someday I might need it. They are totally uninterested in Hummels, Longaberger baskets, Beanie Babies, Stiver prints and my Beatles record collection. Their tastes lean more towards IKEA minimalism and streaming services. Our stereo is an albatross, and don't even think about cassette tapes or DVDs.

However, having said that, I have learned that there are some things that still have high value in my family's estimation. Here's what I do: I take a picture of the item I want to declutter. I send the picture to each of my children. If neither of them want it, I then send it to my grandchildren. If they don't want it I send it to my friends. If the answer is still no. I donate it with a clear conscience.

Here's a sampling of the things they've wanted - all of my "good" jewelry (no surprise there!), Grandmother's china, quilts, two tea sets, original artwork, Polish pottery, Christmas ornaments and decorations, German beer steins, dishes, Aunt Katherine's washstand dresser, and Grandpa's desk. Some things are getting tagged because I'm still using them, like the piano I've promised to my grandson. And my next project is to go through the photos.

So, where am I going with this? First, the generations following me are enjoying these things NOW, instead of it collecting dust in my house. Donating things has helped others without my even missing the stuff. Second, It's a huge burden that has lifted, and a true gift to my daughters for when the time comes that they have to dispose of our things. We owe it to our kids to take care of our own "stuff" responsibly. Third, it gave me a sense of accomplishment and clarity about what's important.

Most importantly, God's word gives us guidance about our possessions. Matthew 6:20 says, "But store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where moths and vermin do not destroy, and where thieves do not break in and steal." Additionally, Luke 12:15 advises, "Take care, and be on your guard against all covetousness, for one's life does not consist in the abundance of his possessions." Other verses like Ecclesiastes 3:6 ("a time to keep, and a time to cast away") and 1 John 2:15 ("Do not love the world or the things in the world") also provide guidance on letting go of unnecessary items and not being consumed by worldly desires. Greeting to each and every one.

Through the first eight months of the year, financially, the church has stayed even with income and expenses. As I stated last month, as believers, everything we have belongs to Him, we are stewards or managers of what God has entrusted to us. This means we're responsible for how we use our time, talents, possessions, and resources our strength or utmost (everything we have). Giving is a God given gift.

Psalm 24:1, "The earth is the Lords, and all that is in it, the world, and those who live in it." The Lord illustrates obedient, sacrificial givers in the Gospels of Matthew and Mark. The commandment is both/and not either/or. The commandment emphasizes that the value of a gift is not measured by its monetary amount, but by the sacrifice it represents. Have we prioritized how we use our time, talents, possessions, and

resources to glorify Him? Are we being obediently sacrificial givers with our all?

Now I want to talk about radical generosity. For radical generosity to exist, you need to see, feel and respond. You need to see that someone is in need or an event requires your attention. Next, you need to let the Holy Spirit open your heart to what you have seen, you need to feel. Third, you need to respond – take action with what God has provided for you. Too many times, we see a problem (leaking faucet, broken window, someone broken down on the side of the road, homelessness, hunger, injustice, abuse) and close our hearts and do nothing. Talking about it, criticizing it, and complaining are responses to a closed heart, they are the language of fear, not of righteous action. My favorite story of radical generosity in the Bible is found in the Gospel of Luke chapter 10.

"Just then a lawyer stood up to test Jesus. 'Teacher,' he said, 'what must I do to inherit eternal life?' He said to him, 'What is written in the law? What do you read there?' He answered, 'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself.' And he said to him, 'You have given the right answer; do this, and you will live.' But wanting to justify himself, he asked Jesus, 'And who is my neighbor?' Jesus replied, 'A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell into the hands of robbers, who stripped him, beat him, and went away, leaving him half dead. Now by chance a priest was going down that road; and when he saw him, he passed by on the other side. So likewise a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan while travelling came near him; and when he saw him, he was moved with pity. He went to him and bandaged his wounds, having poured oil and wine on them. Then he put him on his own animal, brought him to an inn, and took care of him. The next day he took out two denarii, gave them to the innkeeper, and said, "Take care of him; and when I come back, I will repay you whatever more you spend." Which of these three, do you think, was a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of the robbers?' He said, 'The one who showed him mercy.' Jesus said to him, 'Go and do likewise.""

Our giving always follows our affection. What causes our heart to burn leads to our giving. We do not compare nor boast - for it's not equal amounts we give, its equal sacrifice. In our giving, I pray each of us align our hearts with how the Lord has prioritized us to use the treasures He has provided. When you see, feel, and respond you are radically generous! in Christ, Ed

After BRKThrough, we drove back to the church, put on cozy clothes and played a getting-to-know-you game that encouraged us each to interact with every other person in the group. After that, we huddled up for back-to-back movies - Shrek and Shrek 2. I had no idea what a hit movies that were created a decade before the births of most of our students would be. Around 4 am, anybody who remained awake had a mandatory bed time. Praise be. Overall, I think this was one of our most successful lock-ins. I was so pleased at the way the students embraced new friendships with people they'd never even met before.

Our first youth group followed the same pattern of new friendships forged as we had several new kids who we had the opportunity to teach a youth group favorite: Lifesize Clue. Our first lesson was a lead-in to our upcoming series for the month of September; we talked about our stories and how God can redeem even the hardest things we have faced and turn them into good. After a week off for Labor Day, we will have guest speakers for the month of September who will teach us about what life has been like for them through various struggles that they have faced: Homelessness, autism, addiction, and mental illness. I am hopeful that the students will be able to see how God is at work in these people's stories and learn about what it is like to live a life completely different from their own.

On September 20, the youth will help with the Hog Roast to help fund our mission activities, as well as missions and outreach within our community and church. September 17: Moses in the Palace

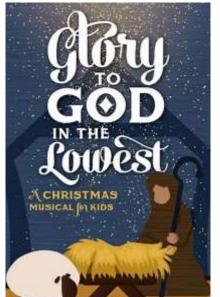

Effectively, the trustees ensure the church's physical resources are well-maintained and utilized to support its mission and ministries. The trustees are the individuals that ensure the lights come on, toilets flush, doors open, and so much more. They are responsible for over five million dollars in total assets. They plan, evaluate, and execute the sustainment and renovation plans that make our historic facility functionally accessible to our congregation and community. The board appreciates and wants your comments and ideas on how we can improve our facilities both short term and into the future. Please feel free to contact Mike Mix, the Trustee chairman at hairymule@gmail.com or any of the other listed trustees.

Currently your trustees are working on a priority list of capital expense projects for FY2025 that include:

- >> Upgrading the fire detection system/security light in the main church building
- Repairing Wesley Hall ceiling and walls post roof replacement
- Upgrading the electrical circuits between the main kitchen and Fellowship Hall
- Back filling the foundation on the west side of the sanctuary and west parking lot wall post gutter replacement
- Replacing the current drinking fountains in the main church and education buildings
- Fall sealing of concrete in the front and angled parking areas of the main church
- Evaluation and consideration on older HVAC units church wide
- ★ Bell rope replacement

Additionally the trustees are formulating a 2026-2028 capital list of "must do" and "like to have" projects. These are prioritized based on need and funds available.
