

Have you ever been ambushed? Maybe you're riding on a stagecoach, carrying this month's payroll to the bank. You're surrounded by outriders, each armed with double barreled 12-gauge shotguns. Suddenly, out of nowhere a group of men with bandanas covering their lower faces, waving guns and riding fast horses appear. The stagecoach screeches to a halt. The outriders lower their shotguns. The horses whinny in fear. The leader of the bandits approaches the stagecoach. Opening the door, he screams "Give me the money!" You have no choice but to surrender. Where are Zorro or the Lone Ranger or Roy Rogers when you need them? YOU'VE BEEN AMBUSHED!

Okay, this was a little extreme, but we are all subject to ambushes. Maybe someone near and dear to you said something so totally and outrageously hurtful that it cut you to the heart. How could they have even thought much less said that? Or maybe a "well meaning" acquaintance, upon seeing your distress said something really insensitive which only made things worse. These remarks can cause real damage if you internalize them and believe them.

I was recently ambushed. A person I've known for years "innocently" and "just trying to help" made a comment about me that was extremely hurtful. For a while it even caused me to question my ministry and mission. My heart heard "You're really bad at this, why do you even try? You're too old, you're no longer relevant." The thing is, I had heard this person do the same thing to others, so I should have known to discount the words, but I didn't. It hurt too much.

The Bible has a solution to this. It's called putting on your armor. Ephesians 6 says "Put on the full armor of God, so that you can take your stand against the devil's schemes. So that when evil comes, you may be able to stand your ground. Stand firm then, with the belt of truth buckled around your waist, with the breastplate of righteousness in place, and with your feet fitted with the gospel of peace. In addition to all this, take up the shield of faith, with which you can extinguish all the flaming arrows of the evil one. Take the helmet of salvation and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God.

See, I knew how this person was. But I neglected to put my armor on. If I'd been prepared I would have been easily able to deflect the barbed words. I would have known that, as a daughter of the Most High King, I had the approval of the only One whose opinion mattered. I could have completely disregarded those words and continued going about living my best life instead of wallowing in self pity.

So, I had my pity party, then I armed myself and got on with it. And the next time you get ambushed, I hope you remember the words in Ephesians too. It certainly makes life easier.

Though I am in my 8th year of youth ministry, it feels like this year has been totally different than any youth year before. From a curriculum standpoint, we tried something entirely new to start the year in that we had special guests come talk about different life experiences; homelessness, mental illness, addiction, Autism. came to the realization that because so much of our youth group has never been to church before, they literally had not ever been told the story of our faith. This resulted in us deciding to take a second non-traditional curriculum choice through Decem-

ber -- we're offering Confirmation through youth group on Sunday evenings. So much of what we talk about in youth group only makes sense if you know the basics, so we thought we'd just focus on the basics for a bit. Then, at the end, all of the students in the youth group who have not been previously confirmed can make the decision for themselves whether or not they would like to be confirmed as "adult" members of the congregation. It's a lot of fun to be able to introduce people with no or minimal prior knowledge of the faith to what makes following Jesus so wonderful.

In addition to our confirmation curriculum, we have a lot of events coming up. On Nov. 1, we'll participate in the serve day and then head out to go visit the Toy and Miniature museum. I'm looking forward to showing the students all the toys I grew up with that are now "antiques." Sigh. Dec. 29 through Jan. 2, is our winter serve trip to San Antonio. There's still time to sign up for that, but I need to know soon if people are planning to attend.

We're wrapping up the Fruit of the Spirit in youth Sunday School. Outside of youth activities, Steven and I are visiting our youth at their extra curricular activities. We have attended a volleyball game and a football game for the band's halftime show. Next month, I'm excited we'll get to see some of our kids in a play!

I am so blessed to get to work with our teenagers and with our amazing staff. I look forward to all the youth group will learn together this year. Our group is growing rapidly, a good problem to have, but one that has impacted our food budget so if you like to cook or bake and want to donate a dish or side or whole meal to the youth group, please reach out and sign up. #### **A Personal Note**

Over the past 7 years, I've been so fortunate to grow into my calling here. I'm grateful for how loved and supported I am in our congregation. You all have given me encouraging words when I preach, have trusted me with your students, have served alongside me, and prayed over me. When my babies were born, you welcomed them into the congregation as family. Last winter, we went through a few weeks where anything that could go wrong in our house seemed to happen. We were so worn out and I just kept thinking, "If we can just make it to Sunday, we can be with our church family and things will feel better." Anytime I talk about our church, I talk about how it feels like home -- safe and familial.

In June, I re-initiated the process to be ordained as a Deacon in the UMC. This has been a long time coming as I received my call to ministry when I was 13. I began the ordination process once before in 2019 days before I gave birth to Junia and the whole world shut down from COVID. I decided to wait until I knew I was done having kids and they were a little more independent. The time has come and I began to feel God prompting my heart again that it was time to affirm not just what God has called me to do, but who I am at my core: a minister.

I have started a two-year process and I have a long road ahead of me, but I have overcome the first hurdle, which is getting approval from my local church. The United Methodist Conference believes that you need the endorsement of your immediate church body. The Staff Parish Relations Committee voted to confirm that I am able to continue my ordination journey. It was also passed at the Church Charge Conference. I know these are early steps and that much more lies ahead of me in this process than what is behind me. But I can't tell you how affirming it was to have our church body support me and confirm my calling. The breakfast menu includes the baked items we signed up for in the church lobby and breakfast burritos. Reminder, if you signed up, you need to have these items to the church on November 9.

On November 22, we again are partnering with Faith Walkers for a coat and turkey give away at Woodland Village. Additionally, we are providing milk and cookies to our elementary schools on December 18. In January, we're going to focus heavily on children. More to come in the following weeks on what that looks like. Children in our own families, children in our church, and children in our community will be our primary kingdom focus. Many children in our community need somebody to walk with them. Not just their parents, not just their family members, not just their church members, but people to walk along with them as they try to thrive and excel, both academically, socially, and emotionally. I ask each of you to look into your hearts and see if you're willing to volunteer at one of our two elementary schools. They need reading and math mentors. They need people just to invest in these kids.

Our children are not the future of our church; they are our church. They are the ones who are going to take us from where we are to where we're going. They're the ones who give us true joy when they say thank you during a fellow-ship meal, when they smile as they are greeted on Sunday or when they're running around in the back of fellowship hall during meals. They are the real joy in our lives and that of our Lord and Savior.





# Say Thanks With Giving

Each Thanksgiving, our church family has a designated offering for local charities. This year our gifts will help feed our community through Meals on Wheels, Stronghold Food Bank on Ft Leavenworth, and Leavenworth Mission. If you would like to contribute to the Thanksgiving offering, please make sure to designate it on your envelope.

Meals on Wheels is operated by the Council on Aging. They deliver hot meals 5 days a week. Several of our

church members help deliver those meals, including Sherry Lauber, Chez Shafer, and Roy and Donna Ramsey. Georgia Moore, the director, said, they are seeing a surge in requests for services because seniors of Leavenworth County are feeling the strain of not being able to meet basic needs due to rising costs. "Last year we increased the suggested donation to \$3 from \$2 but 40% of participants are unable to pay. No senior is ever denied a meal because of their inability to make a donation. We currently pay \$6.50

per meal and are going to the put out a bid request soon. This means that our current caterer or a new caterer can bid at a higher price. We serve approximately 468 meals daily which is 2,342

meals weekly which equates to \$15,223.00 weekly at \$6.50 per meal. We're more than a meal, we're a daily smile and welfare check. Some people tell us we are the best part of their day."

The Leavenworth Mission Food Pantry and Thrift Store was a vision put into action by co-founder Iris Arnold and her husband, David, in 2010. Your donations make a significant difference, especially this year because federal food programs have been substantially lessened. Your donations help restock food so that our pantry is always prepared. The Mission Food Pantry assists over 550 families monthly. They provide food, toiletries, and community outreach. They proudly partner with Second Harvest Food Bank to provide The Fresh Mobile Food Truck. They're located at 123 Broadway. Their pantry is open Tuesdays from 11 am to 1 pm, except when they have a mobile food

pantry. For a complete calendar, check their website lymission.org.

STRONGHOLD Stronghold Food Pantry is a not-for-profit, 100% volunteer-operated organization **FOOD PANTRY** serving American military families. The food pantry is set up as a free shopping pantry for families so clients can pick the items their family will eat. During the Covid pandemic, Monica Basset, an Army spouse, saw a need that took off her blinders to a silent crisis within the military today: food insecurity. After reading multiple requests online from families asking for pantry staples and realizing that one family began checking their neighbors' trash cans for salvageable food, she launched an initiative out of her garage to help anyone in need. A recent poll found that 1 in 4 military families struggle with food insecurity. Stronghold served over 7,000 patrons in 2023. They have distributed over \$30,000 worth of food and household necessities.

Stronghold goes beyond food staples. They provide hunger buster packs to on-base schools which are similar to Backpack Buddies because they do not have that program on fort. They have special holiday bonus bundles around Thanksgiving and Christmas. They have partnered with Happy Bottoms to provide diapers to mothers. One day, Monica saw a need for something that most food pantries don't provide. She found out girls were skipping school because they couldn't afford feminine hygiene products, so Stronghold now provides those as well.

These three charities work hard to provide healthy food for our community. If you are able to help, I know they would appreciate your gift. We will be taking the Thanksgiving Offering through the entire month of November. Everything you give will be divided between the three food pantries. Please mark your gift or use the special Thanksgiving envelope so the money goes to the right place. Thank you.



Sophia's music program has been sacrificed to budget cuts, and she worries not only about her impending unemployment but also about the consequences for her underprivileged students. Sophia has chosen a carol for her church choir set to a poem by Longfellow, moved by the glorious words he penned one Christmas Day long ago, even as he suffered great loss. Christmas Bells chronicles the events of 1863, when the peace and contentment of Longfellow's family was tragically broken, cutting even deeper than the pains of war. Through the pain of profound loss and hardship, Longfellow's patriotism never failed, nor did the power of his language. "Christmas Bells," the poem he wrote that holiday, lives on, as a beloved hymn.

Jennifer Chiaverini's heartfelt novel for the season reminds us why we must continue to hear glad tidings, even as we are tested by strife.
